 a very large arrival of wheat to this day's Market, for which  
 there was a brisk demand at the advance of from 3 to 5 shill-

 dearer, although we had a considerable supply from Essex  
 and Suffolk. Oats were heavy sale at a reduction of 3s. per  
 Quarter, in consequence of the opening of the Ports, which  
 gave admission to a large quantity from Holland. White and  
 Grey Peas 2s per Quarter. In other articles no alteration.

Wheat in the neighbourhood of Portsmouth holds an ave-  
 rage of £20 per load.  
 The Friends, Bulmore, from Amsterdam, is arrived at  
 Cowes, with a cargo of wheat; and the Master reports, that  
 numerous other vessels are lading there with grain to the  
 London Market.

**DUBLIN CORN MARKET, Nov. 20.**—The Market  
 this day was very well supplied with grain, and the sales  
 were dull—the sellers being more numerous than the buyers.  
 Good Wheat was sold from 62 to 65s. New Oats from 16 to  
 18s. some Old Oats brought 24s. Old Flour went off at 56s.  
 Barley 34s. Malt 47s. By the above quotations it will be  
 observed that there was a small decline in the prices from the  
 sales of last week, and it is probable a further decline will be  
 observed in the next Market.

**CORK MARKETS, Nov. 21.**—The admission of  
 Foreign Grain into British consumption, and the unfavorable  
 reception of our Wheat in the English Ports, on account of  
 its inferior state and injured quality, have contributed to de-  
 press our market. The anxiety to obtain large supplies of  
 Oats and Barley has subsided, and they have also met a decline.  
 There is a good quantity of Grain in this day, but the majority
