There is, however, a very important clause in the act, deeply interesting to those con. nected with shipments of grain from the immediate coasts of Holland and France, imports from thence may only be allowed for six weeks. But if it shall, at any time after importation is permitted, appear that the average prices in the first six weeks succeeding the periods 15th Feb 15th May, 15th Aug. and 15th Nov. shall have fallen below the import rates, the import from all places between the River Eyder in Holstein, and the River Bidassoa in Spain, both inclusive, shall cease until a new average shall be made up and published in the London Gazette for regulating the succeeding quarter.
