THE ARMY.

The 47th regt. marched from Colchester for the 15th.

Wheat, 92s 9d. Barley, 44s 5d. Oats, 27s 6d. Rye, 33s 10d. *admitted, without payment of any duty whatever, for the next three months, from foreign countries; and the imports of every description of grain is allowed from the British colonies in North America for the same period, until the next averages are made up (15th Feb. next.) There is, however, a very important clause in the act, deeply interesting to those connected with shipments of grain from the immediate coasts of Holland and France, imports from thence may only be allowed for six weeks. The following are the particulars:—*

But if it shall, at any time after importation is permitted, appear that the average prices in the first six weeks succeeding the periods 15th Feb. 15th May, 15th Aug. and 15th Nov. shall have fallen below the import rates, the import from all places between the River Eyder in Holstein, and the River Bidassoa in Spain, both inclusive, shall cease until a new average shall be made up and published in the London Gazette for regulating the succeeding quarter.
