Police, traced a fellow from Killrush to the town of Clare, where they surprised him in bed, and brought him to account for his misdeeds. It appears that he escaped out of an American vessel at anchor in the Shannon, after having robbed the captain. The lively attention, extreme watchfulness, and strict discipline of the Major's corps has not only restored tranquillity, throughout the principal part of the district where they have been stationed, but has extended its salutary effects to the remotest quarters of the county. And it is with some degree of surprise we (*The Ennis Chronicle*) have been informed that an inflammatory and menacing notice (a copy of which we annex) had been posted, in the present week, within a few miles of Killrush. The lands alluded to in the notice have been untenanted since last February, during which period several houses have been, from time to time, burned thereon:—

LYONS or DOUGH.

"You are to take notice that you caused a great debate yesterday before the *Hon. Captains Slasher, Moonlight, and Spillblood*, the Captain wants to have you get a mortal carding, or flogging, Moonlight wants to have you suffocated in smoke, and consumed in fire. Spillblood wants to have you beheaded and gibbeted for interfering in the lands of Tullyrough, for it is a great breach of the Established Law of England, and re-established in Ireland; but the laws of God are so indulgent as to give you time to repent, and to advertise here whatever sort of death you chose, otherwise to make a public affidavit this day never to possess a sod of said lands; then you shall be excluded from any future punishment.
