

the Budget, to continue, during the consideration of this measure, the contributions of the preceding year, and receive the four first twelfths of the contributions of 1817. The projet has been submitted to the bureaux. The Gazette de France in a second edition, states that several English families, resolving to establish themselves in France, have made extensive purchases of lands in the Southern Departments, and in particular, that no less than 42 families had settled in the Vaucluse. It also states, that an Exchange Agent in Paris has been engaged by several English houses, to make large purchases in the French funds. These reports are not entitled to credit, they savour strongly of being financial puffs, intended to diffuse some confidence in the money dealers of the capital, to whom M. Corvetto must now have recourse, failing in his attempt to negotiate his loan in London.

A letter of a late date from Bourdeaux, states, that the vintage in that department of France, and in many other parts of that country, had completely failed; and that an advance had accordingly taken place on all wines and brandies. The latter, which had been shipped for exportation at 400 francs, had risen to 600 francs, for 50 vells.—London proof was as high as 780 francs.

Lord and Lady Bernard, and the Duchess of Wellington, arrived in London from Paris, on Wednesday.

After the regular examinations in Trinity College, before the Professors of the School of Physician in Ireland, and the performance of the usual exercises, the Diplomas of the Bachelor and Doctor of Medicine has been granted to Mr. James John Ryan, of the city of Kilkenny.

We are credibly informed that above three thousand acres of ground have been surrendered or deserted by the tenants within the last three months, in the immediate vicinity of this town, exclusive of what has been taken possession of by ejection.—Kerry E. Post.

Con. Hinds versus Middleton*.

The high rewards offered for the apprehension of this man, have induced several Amateurs from the *Brown Bear*, in Bow Street, to go in quest of him, very much to the dissatisfaction of the regular Police Officers, who consider the former Gentlemen as Poachers on their Maors.—London Paper.

Friday afternoon, about the hour of five o'clock, a melancholy accident occurred in Parliament street, Dublin; as Mr. Russell, chief Equerry to his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant, was proceeding from the Castle to the Phoenix Park, his horse fell under him, by which he was thrown on his head. He was carried into the house of Mr. Adams apothecary, where he lay a considerable time without the least signs of life; surgical aid was procured, and in the course of the evening he was removed to the Castle, where he remains under the care of Surgeon General and State Surgeon. The fall, it is stated, has produced a concussion in the brain.

His Lordship was born August 3, 1753; succeeded his father Philip, the late Earl, March 7, 1786; and married, in December 1774, Hester Pitt, eldest daughter of William, first Earl of Chatham, sister of the present Earl and of the late Right Honourable William Pitt, by whom he had issue, Hester Lucy Grenville, married to John Tickell, Esq. of Hambledon, Hants; and Lucy Rachel, married to Thomas Taylor, Esq. of Sevenoaks, Kent, since dead. His Lordship married, secondly, in 1791, Louisa, only daughter of Henry Grenville, Esq. late Governor of Barbadoes, and uncle to George, first Marquis of Buckingham, by whom he had issue, Philip Henry, Viscount Mahon, now Earl Stanhope, and two other sons. His Lordship was a firm and incorruptible patriot, deeply read in the policy and history of his country. In him the Arts and Sciences have lost an ardent friend and patron; to them his time and fortune were largely devoted; and to him they are indebted for many ingenious improvements and discoveries. By the Lord Lieutenant and Council of Ireland. A PROCLAMATION.

WHITWORTH. WHEREAS, by our Proclamation of the 22d day of November, 1814, the Town of Templemore, in the County of Tipperary, was nominated as one of the Towns in the Division or District of Nenagh, for the purpose mentioned in an Act made in Ireland, in the Thirty-Sixth year of his Majesty's Reign, entitled, "An Act for the better and more convenient Administration of Justice, and for recovering of Small Debts in a summary way, at the sessions of the Peace of the several counties at large within this Kingdom. (except the county of Dublin.) and for continuing and amending an Act, entitled, an Act for the better execution of the Laws, and preservation of the Peace within Counties at large." And whereas by an Act passed in the 54th year of his Majesty's reign, entitled "An act for the better execution of the Laws in Ireland, by appointing Superintending Magistrates and additional Constables in Counties in certain cases," power is given to the Lord Lieutenant, or other Chief Governor or Governors of Ireland, by and with the advice of the Privy Council, to change or annul the appointment of any Town or Towns in any County or Division, for the purposes mentioned in the said recited Act of the thirty sixth year of his Majesty, and to appoint such other town or towns in lieu thereof, as to him and them shall seem proper. Now we the Lord Lieutenant General and General Governor of Ireland, in pursuance of the powers vested in us for that purpose, do, by and with the advice of the Privy Council hereby annul the appointment made as aforesaid, of the town of Templemore, to be one of the towns for the purposes of the said first recited Act, and in lieu thereof, do substitute and appoint the town of Thurles in the said county of Tipperary, to be one of the towns in the said district of Nenagh, for the purposes of the said Act, of which all persons concerned are to take notice accordingly.
