Three Guineas, his annual subscription to that charity.—The treasurer of the House of Industry has received per W. H. Baylee, Esq. one guinea, from Mr. C. Mayne for that charity.

We understand that the benevolent Archdeacon Wall, of Pallis Green, has, within this last week, distributed upwards of Twenty Pounds to the poor of his neighbourhood, for the purpose of purchasing fuel, of which they stand greatly in need.

On Sunday se'nnight, the brig Cambria, of Aberdeen, from Newcastle, coal laden, was towed into sirbroath harbour, with great difficulty being in a Anking state, having sprung a leak in the gale of the preceding night.

LONDON CORN MARKET, JAN. 9.—At our Market yesterday, there was but a small supply of grain, notwithstanding which, rather low prices were accepted. On Friday there was most abundant Market and brisk sales, but no advance in prices. We have had some arrivals of foreign and Irish corn, purchased for this market; and very considerable quantities of foreign wheat and American flour have reached Liverpool, a great part of which is destined for this country. These acquisitions must prove valuable, and tend to improve the quality of bread, and it is hoped lower the price of grain generally.

DUBLIN MARKET, SUNDAY, JAN. 12.—There was a very plentiful supply of Corn at our markets during the past week, but in consequence of the reluctance of the holders to submit to a reduction of prices, grain of prime quality apparently supported the last quotations. The sales of the fine kind, were, therefore, few, and, and prices almost nominal. Inferior Corn of all denominations, experienced a fall of full two shillings per barrel. Good Oats were in brisk demand. From the numerous recent arrivals of Continental Wheat and American Flour, and a confident expectation which is entertained of additional supplies, the anticipation of a reduction of prices continues to gain ground.
