Paris Fashions.—We continue to see a great many hats of silk shag, in rose and white; but the number of satin hats is become less considerable.— Some of these hats have upon the leaf a large border of silk shag. The greater number is bordered with blond.

The bouquets a la Jardinier, composed of a large rose, with hyacinths, jessamine, and other small flow ers surrounding it, or of roses of two colours, are become very common. The hats continue to be made with a very narrow leaf, flat and equal all round.—
They are of black velvet and white satin. Sometimes the crown or shape of these hats is plaited, with large plaits like a cap.

The following is a Recipe, given in an American Paper, to make a very beautiful paint for the walls of stair cases and lobbies, the cost of which is less than one fourth of that of oil colour, and the beauty far superior:—

Take 4lbs. of Roman vitriol, and pour on it a teas kettle full of boiling water; when dissolved, add two pounds of pearl ash, and stir the mixture well with a stick, until the effervescence ceases, then add \$1b. puls verised yellow arsenic, and stir the whote together; let it be laid on with a paint or white wash brush, and if the wall has not been painted before, two, or even three coats will be requisite. To paint a common sized room with this colour, will not cost more than five or siz dollars. If a peasgreen is required put in less, and if an apple-green more of the yellow arsenic.
