the inland coaches—a fact which further tends to show
the great public service likely to follow from the
adoption of the new system.

As large quantities of potatoes have been frosted, it
may be of use to mention, that, if soaked three hours
in cold water, before they are to be prepared as food,
changing the water every hour, these valuable roots
will recover their salubrious qualities and flavour.—
While in the cold water they must stand where a suf-
ficiency of artificial heat may prevent freezing. If
much frozen before immersed in cold water, to each
peck of potatoes put a quarter of an ounce of salt
petre, dissolved in water, which is to be mixed with
the fluid that boils the potatoes. If the potatoes are
so frozen as to be quite unfit for nourishment to men
or animals, they will make starch, and yield more flour
than if unfermented by the icy power. That flour,
with an equal quantity of wheat flour, some butter,
sugar, a little barm, and a few currents, makes excel-
lent tea bread. If formed into small cakes, and put
into a slow oven, it will keep a month.

DROGHEDA, JAN. 18.—Horrid Murder.—Our feel-
ings are again outraged, in being under the painful
necessity of recording a transaction of the most diabo-
lical nature, which took place on Thursday evening
near Ardee:—The following particulars we have
learned from a gentleman: Mr. John Rath, a res-
pectable and wealthy farmer, and an excellent member
of society, returned on the above evening, from the
sessions of Ardee, to his house at Irishtown, on the
Dundalk road, and about a mile and a half from the
former place. Having sat down in his parlour, with
two friends to dinner, the table lay in front of the
window—one of his guests sat a little distance on his
right, the other on his left—it was then between seven
and eight o'clock, and the shutters were not closed.—
In this situation some hellish miscreant discharged the
contents of a blunderbuss loaded with slugs, which car-
ried off the upper part of his head, and scattered the
brains of the unfortunate victim about the room—
neither of the other persons, we understand, were
injured. One of his friends, shortly, went to Ardee and
informed the police, who, with the military, were in
pursuit of the murderer during the night, but unfor-
tunately did not come up with him. Friday, an inquest
was held by Dr. Blackwell, one of the coroners of the
county, and a verdict of Wilful Murder found against
persons unknown.

On Friday last, ten men were transmitted, under a
strong military escort, from the Barony of Innishowen
to Lifford gaol, committed by Major D'Arcy, five of
them charged with administering unlawful oaths, and
five for conspiring to commit murder.
