Lord Charles Somerset's salary and allowances, as Governor of the Cape of Good Hope, were nearly equal to those of the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland.— They are now reduced to £15,000 a year.

In the London Post Office, the receipts of the last year were less than those of the preceding, by £122,000 which is upwards of £2340 per week.

It is in contemplation to call a meeting of the parochial committees in Dublin, appointed to prepare petitions to parliament praying a repeal of the window tax, to see how far they can assist the Irish representatives to produce a repeal of this cess, and to induce the English representatives to countenance their several petition.

The duty on tea fell short last year £650,000.

A statement of considerable importance to the commercial world, and indeed to the people at large, reached town yesterday, by express from St. Petersburg. It was announced that the exchange upon England had risen there on the 22 instant, the day on which the express stated, to 12; the advance being, within a short time, nearly 30 per cent. The cause of this rapid rise, however the effect may touch the commercial world, was of a nature to be highly promising to the poorer parts of the community. It is stated, that the vast sums drawn for upon England, in payment of the wheat and flour shipped at Odessa for British consumption, had thus materially operated on the course exchange. If so, we may expect a great influx of coin from the Mediterranean.—Globe of last Thursday.

Charles Chetwynd, Talbot Chetwynd, Earl Talbot, Viscount Ingestrie, co. Stafford, and Lord Talbot, Baron of Hensol, Lord Lieutenant co. Stafford; born April 25, 1777; succeeded his father, William, the late Earl, May 19, 1793; married August 23, 1800, Frances Thoinasine Lambert, eldest daughter of Charles Lambert, of Bens Park, in Ireland, Esq. (by Frances, sister of John Dutton, Lord Sherborne,) by whom he has issue, six sons and two daughters. This noble family is descended from Sir Gilbert Talbot, 2d son of John, 2d Earl of Shrewsbury. John Chetwynd, the 1st Earl, married May 7, 1776, Charlotte, daughter of Wills Hill, 1st Marquess of Downshire, by whom he had issue, Charles Chetwynd, the present Earl. Heir Apparent—Charles Thomas, Viscount Ingestrie, son of the Earl—Motto—*Humani nihil alienum*. Nothing is foreign to me which relates to man.

DUBLIN MARKET, JAN. 26.—For some time back, we have had to note a progressive increase of supplies, at our Corn Markets, and a gradual, though not proportionate decline in prices; and the transactions of the last week leave us little more to do at present.—The sales effected were very limited, and the prices though somewhat under the last quotations, were still above what might have been expected. Fresh arrivals of foreign Wheat are daily looked for; the stock of Flour is accumulating, and the Liverpool and other English markets are falling. These circumstances justify the cheering anticipations which continue to be indulged in respect to the disappointment of the speculators on starvation. Good Foreign Wheat may be set down at 94s. per barrel: some very fine has been rated at above 100. Very good Flour brought 60 and 62; middling 57; and some prime American went up to 64s. per cwt. best English Flour was offered at 55s. Good Oats continue brisk; Barley is also in demand. Large purchases of Beef have been made this week, and the prices, have in consequence, increased very considerably. Sales were easily made at 102s. and 6d. per tierce, and 107s. 6d. and 110s. are now demanded. Sugars, both in England and Ireland, are rather heavy, and those which were sold went at a reduction of 2s.

Whiskey nominally supports its price this week; 12s. 6d. per gal. duty paid; though we have an idea that purchases might be effected at least something less than 6s. 6d. in bond.

Hops are scarce, and bring good prices. Coals are at the former rates.
