Fresh arrivals of foreign Wheat are daily looked for ; the stock of Flour is accomulating, and the Liverpoo! and other English markets are falling. These circumstances justify the cheering anticipations which continue to be indulged in respect to the disappointment of the speculators on starvation. Good Foreign Wheat may be set down at 94s, per barrel : some very fine has been rated at above 100. Very good Flour brought 60 and 62; middling 57; and some prime American went up to 64s. per cwt. best English Flour was effered at 55s. Good Oats continue brisk; Barley is also in demand.
