London, Thursday Evening, half past 7 o'clock.

We are enabled to state the highly important fact that a treasonable plan and correspondence, have been detected against the state, and all the papers relative thereto seized and placed in the hands of Government.

The above was received in this country from a private correspondent, but is not noticed in the London papers.

A reward of One Thousand Pounds has been offered for the discovery of the person or persons guilty of the late treasonable attempt on the life of the Prince Regent.
