A PROCLAMATION. 66

### WHITWORTH.

WHEREAS by an act of parliament passed in the fifty fourth year of his present Majesty, entitled "An act to provide for the preservation and restoring of peace in such parts of Ireland as may at any time be disturbed by seditious persons, or by entering into unlawful combinations or conspiracies." it is enacted, that it shall be lawful for the justices of the peace of any county, assembled at an extraordinary session of the peace summoned in manner by the said act directed, and pursuant to the provisions therein contained, not being fewer than seven, in a county at large, or than three in a county of a city or town, or the major part of them, if they see fit, upon due consideration of the state of the county, to signify by memorial by them signed, to the Lord Lieutenant, or other chief governor or governors of Ireland, for the time being, that they consider the county, or any part thereof, to be in a state of disturbance, or in immediate danger of becoming so, and the grounds and reasons of such their opinion, and praying that the Lord Lieutenant and council may proclaim such county, or part thereof, to be in a state of disturbance, or in immediate danger of becoming so, and thereupon it shall and may be lawful to and for the Lord Lieutenant, or other chief governor or governors of Ireland for the time being, by and with the advice of his Majesty's privy council in Ireland, by proclamation to declare, such county, or any part of such county, to be in a state of disturbance, or in immediate danger of becoming so, as also such part as he or they shall think proper of any adjoining county.

And whereas twenty justices of the peace of the county of Louth, being the major part of the justices of the peace duly summoned and assembled, pursuant to the provisions for that purpose in the said act contained, at an extraordinary session of the peace, holden in and for said county of Louth, on the ninth day of November last, and duly summoned pursuant to the said act, have by memorial by them signed, signified to his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant, that the baronies of Ardee, Louth, Upper Dundalk, and Lower Dundalk, are in immediate danger of becoming in a state of disturbance, and the grounds and reasons of such their opinion and have thereby prayed that the Lord Lieutenant and Council may proclaim the said baronies of Ardee, Louth, Upper Dundalk, and Lower Dundalk; to be in such immediate danger.

Now we the Lord Lieutenant, by and with the advice of his Majesty's privy council, in pursuance of and by the authority to us given by the said act of parliament, do by this our proclamation declare the baronies of Ardee, Louth, Upper Dundalk, and Lower Dundalk, in the county of Louth aforesaid, to be in a state of disturbance, or in immediate danger of becoming so; and do hereby warn the inhabitants of the said baronies of Ardee, Louth, Upper Dundalk, and Lower Dundalk, that they each and every of them, be and remain within their houses at all hours between sun set and sun rise, from and after Sunday next, the ninth day of February, instant, under the penalties by law established. And we do hereby further order and direct, that a special session of the peace for the said county of Louth, be held in the town of Dundalk, in the said county, on Monday next, the tenth day of February instant, for the purposes expressed in said act of parliament, of which all justices of the peace and other magistrates for the said county, and all others whom it may concern, are to take notice.
