The following Article we copy from the Lon-
don Observer, given in a Second Edition, late
on Sunday Evening :—

CHARGE OF HIGH TREASON.

This morning, between the hours of eight and nine o'clock,
John Stafford, of Bow street, assisted by several officers, entered
the house of John Evans, brace maker, 8, Newcastle street,
Strand, and insisted upon taking him and his son away, under
an order from Lord Sidmouth, commonly known by the
name of a general warrant. They immediately searched the
house for papers, while some of the officers kept the father
and son in close custody. The officers took a bag of papers,
with books, a work just published, called "An Address of
the Society of the Spencean Philanthropists to all Mankind, on
the means of promoting Liberty and Happiness." Evans
informed the officers, he would not quit his house without
force compelled him so to do; upon which the officer instantly
collared him. "Now," said Evans, "you have used force,
I will go peaceably." Upon the officers tying up the bag,
Young Evans observed, "Let us seal our own papers with
our own seal." One of the officers replied, "What do you
do that for?" Old Evans emphatically said to the officers,
"Because inflammatory papers may be put into the bag, to
make it Treason, for I know you, gentlemen of old. It is
an illegal document, I am certain; I have done nothing that
I am ashamed of, or to be used thus!" The officers observed,
they had only done their duty, and had acted according to
their directions. Some friends of Mr. Evans being sent for,
upon their arrival they thought it was proper that a copy of
the Warrant should be immediately granted. The officers
said the copy might be obtained at the Police Office. Evans
and his son were then conveyed in a coach to Bow street,
where they are now undergoing a private examination. The
bag was accordingly sealed, with the seal of young Evans,
bearing the initials of "T. E." The elder Watson and
Preston were also taken into custody, at eleven o'clock this
morning, at Preston's house, in Greystoke place, Fetter lane.

To the above, we may add, that the officers, upon making
their caption, produced the warrant, but refused to alledge
any specific charge against Mr. Evans and his son.

for the purpose of presenting a congratulatory Address to his
Royal Highness the Prince Regent, on his happy escape in the
late atrocious attempt made upon his Royal Highness's person.
After the Mayor had taken the Chair—

The Lord Bishop rose and said, that he, as one of the
persons who had signed the requisition to the Mayor, thought
it necessary to explain to the meeting the object for which they
were called together, though he was satisfied it was pretty
generally known :—it was to address his Royal Highness the
Prince Regent of the United Kingdom, on his late escape
from the abominable attempt upon the life of his sacred
person, and to express their abhorrence at so base an act.—
"Assassination (continued his Lordship) is not the character
of a British subject, and the idea of it, is equally as obnoxious
to the character of an Irishman."—(Applause.)—He would
read the copy of an address which he had prepared for the
occasion, and which, he believed, contained the sentiments
and feelings of, not only every person present, but of every
loyal man in the kingdom, and moved that it be adopted.

The Lord Bishop read as follows :—
"May it please your Royal Highness,
"We, his Majesty's most faithful and loyal subjects, the
Gentlemen, Clergy, and other Inhabitants of the City of
Limerick, humbly beg permission to address your Royal
Highness, anxious to express our sincere regret and utter
abhorrence of the late atrocious attack made upon the person
of your Royal Highness; and to offer our most heartfelt con-
gratulations upon the complete failure of so diabolical an
attempt!

"We beg leave to assure your Royal Highness, that, tho'
far removed from the seat of Government, we are ever alive
to the honor and dignity of the Crown; and that we view the
flagitious insult offered to it, (in the person of your Royal
Highness,) with deep and unaffected concern."
The Right Hon. Colonel Vereker, M. P. in a neat speech
seconded the motion.
