We cannot too highly applaud the well-timed and munificent bequest of Thomas Lloyd, of Beechmount, Esq. of one hundred pounds worth of turf, to the poor of Rath keale. We shall be happy to find this example widely followed up, as at this inclement season fuel is as necessary to the preservation of the poor as food.—We would recommend the adoption of the following plan to the benevolent in all towns and villages, where the scarcity of fuel puts it out of the power of the poor to purchase, which is unfortunately but too generally the case at present, from the wetness of last season. The public are indebted to a reverend gentleman at Clones, county of Monaghan, for the idea, and the poor of that town, for his having at his own expence put it into execution. This gentleman had a large tin pan made, about four feet by two, and two feet deep, which he set up, as a public boiler, in an uninhabited house, where he supplied the necessary quantity of fuel to keep it boiling from morning until evening, and, in addition, he supplied a dozen of little nets, to each of which a string is attached, knotted to answer as numbers, first one knot, and so on: by which means the poor readily ascertain their own potatoes, and as soon as they are boiled carry them away, leaving the nets in their own proper places for the use of others. By this ingenious plan the unfortunate are materially relieved, at a very trifling expence, considering the number who are benefited by so simple a process.

COMMERCIAL REPORT.

LONDON MARKETS, FEB. 25.—CORN—The supply of Wheat in yesterday's market was trivial, owing to the continuance of unfavourable winds; the best runs in consequence, sold ready at an improvement of 1s. a 2s per quarter—in the foreign there was also more business done, but the parcels taken were limited as to quantity; the prices cannot be stated at any variation.—Fine Barley was in great request, and the picked samples realized an improvement of 2s. a 3s. per quarter; there was an increased request for dry samples for grinding; no alteration can however be noticed in the prices.—The supply of Oats at market was rather limited, but purchasers for immediate consumption were obliged to comply with prices a shade higher, but there was no general improvement or briskness in the trade.

IMPORTS OF FOREIGN GRAIN, &c.—The perpetual uncertainty of the Corn law, makes it difficult for us to offer an opinion respecting the next six weeks average; yet we beg to suggest, that, from the decline of the market, there is some probability that, after that time, the Import of foreign Oats may again be prohibited. The following are the aggregate averages of the twelve maritime districts, by which imports of foreign grain are at present regulated.

Wheat, 100s. 10d.—Rye, 61s.—Barley, 50s. 9d.—Oats, 29s. 8d.

Letters received yesterday state, that considerable exports of middling and inferior Wheat had taken place from the East coast of England, for the French ports. About 12,000 brls. of American Flour arrived at Liverpool last week, above 4000 were reported at this port, the prices here are 68s. a 75s.

By the Lord Lieutenant and Council of Ireland, A PROCLAMATION.

WHITWORTH.

WHEREAS the time limited by the proclamation of the Lord Lieutenant and Council of the 27th day of August last, for prohibiting the exportation out of Ireland, or carrying coastwise gunpowder, salt petre, or any sort of arms or ammunition, has expired.

And whereas it is judged expedient that the said prohibition, so far as applies to the countries herein-after named, should be renewed and continued for some time longer.

Now we the Lord Lieutenant and Council do therefore hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no person or persons whatsoever (except the master general of the ordnance for his Majesty's service,) do at any time between the date hereof, and the thirteenth day of August next, presume to transport any gunpowder or salt petre, or any sort of arms or ammunition, to any port or place on the coast of Africa, or in the West Indies, or on any part of the continent of America, (except to a port or place, or ports or places in his Majesty's territories or possessions on the continent of North America, or in the territories of the United States of America,) or ship or

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
