I think it must be so, or by worthy friends who
never have brought it forward—"it is true,"
from several persons, "the Ladies are in the gal-
leries." Then I think it is a matter highly wor-
thy of our attention. Is it at this period of civi-
lization, that the noblest, I may say, angelic work
of charity, the instruction in religion and morality
of the rising generation, is to be blighted by big-
try? No, forbid it, Heaven! I trust we have
but one feeling on it; and, as soon as the Reso-
lutions before you are disposed of, I will move a
Resolution, which, I trust, will fully and comple-
tely do away this odious measure.

When the fourth Resolution was moved,
Mr. Woulfe seconded it in a most animated and
eloquent speech.

On the sixth resolution being read, Mr. Con-
nell moved, that the Secretary do read the letter of
the Right Hon. H. Grattan, after which Mr.
Beachan addressed the meeting.

Mr. O'Connell then rose, amid the applause of
the whole meeting, and spoke for upwards of an
hour. He concluded by moving the following
Resolutions, which passed in like manner as the
former ones:—

"That the fact stated, respecting the Poor House, be as-
certained, and then that the Earl of Donoughmore be requested
to bring that measure before the House of Lords, and that
means be taken to bring the attention of the House of Com-
mons to the same subject

"That the future management of their Petition, and the
subject of the foregoing Resolution, be referred to the Mem-
bers of the Catholic Board, Association, and Committee"

Mr. Nicholas Mahon wished that the Lord
Lieutenant should be addressed on the subject of
the House of Industry, as it was the shortest mode
of getting redress for this grievance.

Mr. O'Connell would by no means agree to it
—he did not know what the Lord Lieutenant had
done to deserve an address from the Catholics of
Ireland; if he would interfere in this case, he
could not fail to be informed of it, as the minions
of the police were, no doubt, within hearing, and
they would report it: if they did not, the News-
papers would do it, and then if his Excellency did
redress this horrid, odious measure, the Catholics
would address him.

A Gentleman stated, that the order was general.
He had been informed that it was in consequence
of the number of Methodists resorting to it that
occasioned the measure.

Christopher Taylor, Esq. being called to the
chair, the thanks of the meeting were given to Sir
Thomas Esmonde, Bart.

The meeting then began to disperse, when a
pick-pocket was taken in the Vestry passage, in
the very act of picking pockets, he was brought to
Duke-street Office, and he turned out to be an old
offender, of the name of James Coffey. He was
charged by George Farley, of South Anne-street,
Esq. as having seen him make several attempts
at a gentleman's pocket. The moment he suc-
ceeded in drawing out what appeared a pocket-
book, he seized him, and informed the gentleman,
Surgeon Enright, of Baggot-street, that his pocket
had been picked of a red morocco case, which was
his case of Surgical Instruments. Both Gentlemen
lodged their informations before Mark Magrath,
Esq. and the fellow was sent to Newgate to abide
his trial at the quarter sessions.

On Wednesday, the 77th regt. were inspected by General
Barry, and Staff Surgeon Graydon, when there were found to
be 56 unfit for foreign service. The 93d regt. were inspected
on Thursday—74 unfit.

The recruiting companies of forty eight regiments have
been discontinued, and the officers placed upon half pay.

Royal Scots (3d bat.) 21st, 27th (1st bat.) 40th, 81st, 88th,
and 200 men from each bat. of the foot guards in France.

The Lord Bishop of Limerick, as President of the Fund
for Relief of the Poor, has obtained from Government the
useless blankets now in the barrack stores, at a nominal price,
for use of the Poor.
