LONDON CORN EXCHANGE, MARCH 26.—We
 had but few fresh arrivals this morning, and very few buyers
 at market. The wheat trade is very dull. In short, there
 were so few sales made in any kind of grain, that we consider
 the prices nominally the same as on Monday.

DUBLIN MARKET, MARCH 29.—The corn market,
 yesterday was something larger than that of Wednesday, but
 the demand was equally dull for all kinds of grain. In wheat
 there was no alteration. The quality of this kind of grain
 brought to market here, is improving, and we are happy to
 have received the same account from several other places, as
 well outports as the interior. There was but a poor supply
 of market, from 26s. to 32s.; some fine malting barley was
 sold this week at 37s. 6d. Oats were in good supply, but the
 demand was bad, and the price down about 1s. to 1s. 6d.—
 No alteration in flour—prime seconds 56s. to 60s. per cwt.
 American 98s. to 100s. per barrel 196lbs. As the sale of
 good flour increases beyond that of inferior, the price of bread
 must advance. Whiskey still dull at 12s. 8d. for small
 parcels. In other articles there has been little or no change.
