

Priest of Carrickfergus and Larne." We suspect that he is in himself a church—of which he is at once Pope, Cardinal, Bishop, Dean, Rector, Curate, Precentor, Wardeu, and Laity. He carries his credentials in his large coat pockets, or rather wallets, which, being crammed even to repletion with papers, thrust out their cumbersome bulk at his haunch bones like stuffed saddle-bags, or turf panniers projecting from the ribs of a Killeavy colt. A number of papers are also wedged into the interior of his hat, and he is altogether a kind of ambulatory register of the marriages he has solemnized, and the rites he has performed, as the sole dignitary in his Irish, Catholic, Protestant, legal, regal Church.—*Dublin Paper.*

The state of the case of the Rev. Jas. Matthew Vincent M'Cary, is as follows:—

That he, the above-named, by virtue of a warrant carrying date, Sunday, the 2d of March instant, from his own house, in the town of Belfast, County of Antrim, Ireland, was conducted unto the Police-office Prison-house, in the town of Belfast aforesaid, and detained prisoner unto the next day, conducted and lodged prisoner in the county of Antrim gaol, in the town of Carrickfergus, unto this present date,

For accusations alleged against him, on oath of an unknown person, accusing the above-mentioned Rev. James M. V. M'Cary, as a reputed Popish Priest, to have celebrated marriage rites, &c. betwixt Arthur Connor, a reputed Protestant, and Anne M' Mullan, a member of the Church of Rome, or Romish Papal Church of Rome—

The above-named Arthur Connor and Anne M' Mullan, aforesaid publicly, christianly, declaring to believe, and to profess, the true Irish, christian, original faith and religion, in its christian purity, without addlog or diminishing, in any one point whatsoever.

And, likewise, declaring to have obtained the assent and permission of their parents, of being married unto each other—he declaring himself to be of age, 19 years, and she, aged 20 years, &c.

Unto all of which, &c. as above-said, both parties above named, and their witnesses, &c. freely, wilfully, having signed, and subscribed their names and marks, affirming all the above, &c. to be true, as may appear in their certificate of marriage lines, and book of registry, &c. witnessed in due form, as usual and general.

The above-named Arthur Connor and Anne M' Mullan, are believed never to have received any christian sacrament, or christian communicating sacrament in any christian, regal, legal, established church, since their christian baptism—no nor their marriage-subscribing witnesses.

Therefore, it is believed, that neither of them is, of any christian church, a firm, fixed member, and believed to be of present liberty to profess themselves members of any christian church, as their best knowledge, consciousness, &c. &c. may please to direct them to make choice of.

The above-named Rev. Jas. M. V. M'Cary, never directed said Arthur Connor, nor Anne M' Mullan, aforesaid, nor either of them, nor their subscribing marriage-witnesses, at any time, to profess the Romish, papal church of Rome faith, or religion.

The above-named J. M. V. M'Cary, aforesaid, is no Romish papal, vassalage, popish priest; he publicly, solemnly, by his public declarations, publications, oaths, &c. of regal, legal qualifications, &c. having denied civil and ecclesiastical assalage, &c. unto the Pope of Rome—unto the Romish, papal, vassalage church of Rome, and unto the Romish papal dignity and authority, &c. of the church of Rome.

He, the above-named James M. V. M'Cary, aforesaid, is the Irish, christian, catholic, protestant, parish priest, &c. of Carrickfergus & Larne, and their annexed parishes, in the county of Antrim, for upwards of thirty years—

High prices, expected importations, and the prospect of an early and plentiful harvest, tend much to damp the ardour of purchasers. Any Grain that was sold went under the late quotations. Wheat, Barley, Oats, Oatmeal, and Flour, are all looking downwards. A considerable quantity of indifferent Bread has been sold this week, made, it is supposed, from a mixture of damaged Flour, (in a small proportion) with the sweet Foreign Flour. The city officers should enquire into this abuse.

We have nothing new to report in Teas, Coffees, Cocoas, Spirits, Sugars, Wines, or Whiskey. Beef, Mutton, Butter, Potatoes, and Coals have also remained without any sensible, or at all events, material variation.
