

THE BARBARY POWERS.

The Algerine Navy is represented as becoming strong again. The fortifications of Algiers are also said to be in a progress of restoration to their former state. The other Barbary Powers pursue their depredations against the ships of Christian States, as they had done before Algiers became an object of British vengeance.—All the States of the Barbarian class appear to be drawing closer in amity since the event in question.

YOUNG WATSON.

It is said that young Watson has arrived in America, with a shoemaker, in whose apartments he was secreted at the time the Bow-st. officers were pursuing him. He declares that he had no previous acquaintance with the person who afforded him an asylum.

THE ARMY.

The 2d bat. of the 62d regt. has left Dublin for Cork, to embark for Nova Scotia.

The 1st division of the 82d regt. has left Cork for Birr, and has been replaced by the right wing of the 61st, lately arrived from France. The left wing of this regt. has marched to relieve the 50th in the counties of Cork and Kerry.

The 92d Highlanders, from Scotland, on its arrival at Donaghadee, is ordered to replace the 1st Royal Scots in Belfast. The Royals are to march to Enniskillen, to replace the 2d bat. of the 27th, ordered to Dublin, to be consolidated with the 1st bat.

The 51st light infantry has left Brighton for Chatham.

A company of the 38th regiment has left Edinburgh for Berwick.

A General Court Martial is now assembled and sitting in Cork, of which Colonel Hawker is President.

ALARMING FIRE.

Perhaps these twenty years there has not been a more terrific fire than broke out on Thursday night, about a quarter before nine o'clock, in the rear of Mr. Geoghegan's Castle-st. Dublin, Druggist. The fire burst forth in this Gentleman's stores situate in Sall's Court, Fishamble-street. From the confined situation of the place, and the combustible nature of the stored goods, the whole neighbourhood was threatened with destruction; but from the exertions of the people who were assembled numerous casks of oil, turpentine &c. &c. were rolled out into Fishamble-street. The Police were first on the spot, and until the military came, kept order: Both the sheriffs arrived by nine o'clock: Mr. Sheriff Read took his station in Castle street, Mr. Sheriff Dixon in Fishamble street. Major Sir was most attentively labouring under to procure water for the engines, which arrived in quick succession. By the united efforts of all, the fire had been in a great measure, got under by one o'clock. Mr. Geoghegan's establishment, opened as soon as possible, two seven inch mains in Castle street, which gave a very great supply of water. It would be invidious to mention the exertions of any engine, whether Parish or belonging to any Insurance Company in this city, for all, as they arrived, and were supplied with water, were equally on the alert. We fear the inhabitants of Sall's court, Johnson's court, and the surrounding houses, have a still further load of misery added to their already deplorable situations. The premises of Mr. Geoghegan were insured.

One of the Magistrates of the Head Office of Police attended until the fire was got under; and we have his authority for stating to our fellow citizens, that he witnessed, with very great pleasure, the prompt and ready attendance of the water carts belonging to the Paving department, constantly bringing a fresh supply of water; by which means much facility was given towards extinguishing the flames, which threatened destruction to the whole neighbourhood.

On Saturday last, the Rev. Lucius George, A. M. was collated and instituted by the Right Rev. the Lord Bishop of Limerick, Ardferst and Aghadoc, to the Rectory and Vicarage of Ballyheige, in the county Kerry, and Diocese of Ardferst, vacant by the resignation of the late incumbent, the Rev. John Duffin, A.M.
