In addition to the sails and cordage belonging to the revenue boat, which was stolen on the night of Thursday last, (as stated in our paper of Friday) several other articles the property of individuals, which were in the boat at the time, were also carried off—the entire, to the value of about £30, was sold to Connor Galven, Michael Galven, and Thomas Garroll, for the trifling sum of 7s. 6d. They deny having known that it was stolen, but the insignificant sum demanded for articles worth fifty times what was asked, must have convinced them to the contrary. They were arrested at or near Grass Island, principally through the exertions of Mr. John Herbert, watch inspector of St. Michael's parish, John Lynch, Mathew Sharp, and Thomas Deacy, have been committed to the city gaol, by Alderman Watson, charged with cutting away the sails, &c. and the Galvens and Carroll have also been committed by said Magistrate, for having assisted them therein.

Last Thursday, a party of Major Warburton's corps of police cavalry arrived in Ennis, from Kiltrush, to which place they escorted John Carey, where he was to be publicly whipped, pursuant to his sentence at the last assizes.

Thursday morning, Thomas Crowe, Esq. apprehended a suspicious stranger, and committed him to Ennis jail. He now turns out to be the faithless pointer of Mr. Rich. Storey, of Limerick, whom he robbed some days preceding.

Yesterday, a transmit warrant was directed by Alderman Watson, to Thomas Crowe, Esq. Magistrate of the County Clare, for conveying Charles Tidings, confined in the gaol of Ennis, for being idle and disorderly; he is identified by Mr. Richard Storey as the man who a few days ago absconded with notes intrusted to his care. This is the man for whose apprehension a reward was offered in our last; to the activity of Mr. Crowe (the Gentleman abovenamed,) and Alderman Watson, too much credit cannot be given.

On Saturday night, about one thousand persons assembled on the newly inclosed commons at Gowran, county Kilkenny, levelled the whole of the fences, and destroyed the cars, tack, ling and implements of labour employed in forming the inclosure in less than an hour.

On Thursday, an inquest was held on the body of Florence M'Carthy, (better known by the name of *Shaking Flor.*) who had been found dead the preceding day, in a field in the neighbourhood of where he was found, at which he had drunk to great excess. Verdict—“That he came by his death by intoxication.”

An inquest was held near Clones, county Kilkenny, on the body of a man who was found insensible in a ditch, with a deep wound on his head, supposed to be inflicted by a bayonet, or some similar weapon.

Orders are said to have been issued from the Admiralty for fitting out several frigates. Several houses of rendezvous have in consequence been opened in Wapping and many able seamen engaged. The object of the preparations has not transpired.

It is said that Pendrill, who was so instrumental in the escape of young Watson, is a lineal descendant of Pendrill, the miller, to whom Charles the Second owed his escape after the battle of Worcester.

The Libel case of “The King, at the prosecution of John Giffard, against John Holohan, Proprietor of the Dublin Chronicle,” is postponed until July Sessions.

In the Court of King's Bench on Friday, the Attorney General filed three criminal informations against Wm. Hone, a bookseller in Fleet street, Dublin, for printing and publishing certain blasphemous libels, being parodies upon the Lord's Prayer, the Creed of St. Anthanasius, the Ten Commandments, and the Litany.

The demand which was very apparent on Wednesday, seemed yesterday to have wholly disappeared, and no buyers for any kind of grain, &c. were to be met with. Wheat, 84s. to 70s. nominally—Barley, 20s. to 23s.—Malting samples, 31s. to 36s.—Oats, 17s. to 28s.—for the very best oatmeal, 24s. to 26s.—Flour, American, 80s. to 83s. per cask—good seconds, 33s. to 46s.—inferior, most in demand, 36s. down to 22s.—superfine American rye flour, 35s. per cwt.—Malt, dull, 40s. to 55s.—Whiskey, stationary, in better demand, 12s. to 12s. 3d.—some Cork whiskey in the market, at the latter price.
No demand as yet for grass seeds—Flaxseed is going off, at £3 18s. to £4 for old New York; £5 to £4 15s. for new. In the other articles of general consumption, the prices remain steady.
