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of his alterations, reserving that point for future discussion when the Bill, as amended, might be laid before the House. The principal change, however, relates to the mode of security to the Government on the advance of money, and consists in modifying personal security, which, under certain cases, will be dispensed with, & special securities substituted. Mr. Brougham and Mr. Western made some objections to the plan, the former gentleman dwelling principally on its constitutional effect, and expressing some very natural apprehensions on the influence which the patronage of so large a sum of money must have in case of a dissolution of Parliament, which Mr. Brougham seemed to regard as certain on the close of the present Session.

FARMING SOCIETY.—Same night Colonel Barry presented a petition from that most beneficial society, the Farming Society of Ireland, relative to the extension of Legislative encouragement to the Wool Growers in Ireland, to grow the finer descriptions of wools, which was read and ordered to lie on the table.

IRISH GRAND JURY PRESENTMENTS AND JOBS.—Mr. S. Cooper moved for a return of the names of the county treasurers and collectors of public money in the several counties of Ireland, from the 1st of July, 1810, to the present time, who had been deficient in their accounts, with the names of their sureties, distinguishing accurately each individual and his respective sureties; and also an account of the various bills of costs, and their amount, charged to the public accounts for proceedings taken to recover the several sums of money so in default. He said he felt it peculiarly a duty he owed to his country to submit the present motion, from having been a witness to the shameful traffic which was carried on in Ireland, respecting Grand Jury appointments, assessments, and other official transactions connected therewith. Owing to the present mode of mismanagement, the public, in cases of default in the treasurers and collectors of public money, not only sustained to a considerable loss, but were put to an expense yearly of suits to recover the sums thus in default, which rarely ever produced any thing—an attorney not unfrequently making £500 per ann. in prosecuting suits, the very costs of which even fell upon the public purse. The city of Cork exhibited an instance of a job, relative to the Grand Jury Presentments, which he considered scandalous in the extreme. The Grand Jury of Cork occupied a house there, for which they paid £1000 fine and £300 per annum, the fair estimate of which he considered to be about £200 fine and £70 per annum. This one example might serve for an exemplification of various other towns in Ireland, whose Grand Jury presentments were similarly prodigal, and savoured as strongly of the nature of a job.

Mr. Denis Browne, Mr. Peel, Sir N. Colthurst, General Mathew, and others, severally spoke on the Motion, when it was agreed to.

TAXES.—Sir John Newport means to call the attention of the House of Commons to the state of the taxes and finance of Ireland. As far as the papers laid before the house afford any intelligence upon the subject, he will have to disclose a very ungrateful prospect. An official return to an order of the House of Commons, states the total amount of the revenue, including customs, excise, stamps, and postage, paid into the treasury, in the year ending the 25th of March, 1816, at £5,276,126 10s. 3d.; ditto, in the year ending 1817, 4,191,060 11s. 1d.—being a deficiency, in the last year, of £1,085,065 19s. 2d. The whole of this deficiency is nearly in the two first articles of our

On Friday night, the mail coach from Cork to Cashel was upset at Abbeyleix, by which one of the guards was killed, another desperately wounded, and an outside passenger severely hurt.

At a late hour on Thursday night last, two fellows, Michael Mulvihill, and John Doolen, confined in the county gaol, for robbery, attempted to escape from prison, but were fortunately prevented by the vigilance of the gaoler, who detected them in the act of cutting their blankets and fastening them to ropes for the purpose of scaling the walls of the prison.
