 grain it contained, about 30 barrels, with a horse, bridle and

LIMERICK RACES.—We perceive by Mr. O'Brien's ad-
 vertisement, a meeting at Newcastle will depend upon the
 inhabitants of this city and of the surrounding counties. Mr.
 O'Brien is perfectly right—the responsibility is heavy, and
 exclusive of the plates, his beautiful course, comprising several
 hundred acres of valuable land, is thrown open to the public,
 and becomes, for several weeks, a beaten commonage—all these
 considerations combined, give him a strong claim on the pre-
 vious and ascertained support of the public, for whose amuse-
 ment they are intended. The town of Birr, holding no pro-
 portion to the population of Limerick, annually gives three
 plates, although the course is six miles from the town.—
 Mallow gives two plates, and the course is four miles from
 town. And when we hear from an undoubted quarter, that
 the entire amount of the subscriptions among the shop keepers
 and hotel keepers did not exceed, last year, seven gui-
 neas! it is but common justice to Mr. O'Brien, and to the
 proprietors of the running horses, to adopt this system of
 previous ascertainment, when the various expences of the
 meeting are estimated at nearly £600. We well know, that
 a large subscription could easily be raised in this city, in such
 proportions, as not to be felt by any individual, and as would
 relieve Mr. O'Brien from any risque or responsibility on the
 occasion.

An official account of the net revenue of customs and
