MELANCHOLY ACCIDENT.—Tuesday, at one o'clock,
Captain Harris, of Townsend street, passing through the
Canal Company's ground, at the Floating Docks, was seized
with a fit of apoplexy, and instantly expired. Surgical
assistance was immediately procured from Sir Patrick Dunn's
Hospital, but unfortunately without effect.

About one o'clock on Monday morning, several
ruffians broke into the house of a farmer, named
Moloney, near Castle Crine gate, County Clare—
Moloney made a desperate resistance with a pitch fork,
and wounded some of them, but the party being nu-
merous they not only beat him but robbed his box of
16 guineas in gold. In the morning an appearance of
blood being perceived outside the door, Molony and
his neighbours traced it over the mountain road to
within a very short distance of this City.

On Thursday night last, a young girl, aged about 17 years,
who has a property in her own right, of two hundred pounds,
was taken by force from the house of her sister at Ballylander,
in this county, with only the covering of a cloak and petti-
coat, by an armed banditti, and conveyed some miles across
the country, to a lonely house in the neighbourhood of Gal-
bally, where a ruffian of the name of Patrick Rawley, a
blacksmith of infamous character, whom she had never seen
but once before, by force completed her ruin. On the fol-
lowing morning, that excellent and active Magistrate, Godfrey
Massey, Esq. and Major O'Donoghue, with the police
establishment, set on so close a search that the ruffian Rawley
fled from the house where he had lodged his victim, and
though closely pursued for some miles, effected, for the pre-
sent, his escape, by taking to the bogs. The unfortunate girl
was restored to her friends, and two wretches of her own sex,
who were principals in the outrage, committed to prison.

THREE CRIM. CON. CASES.

COURT OF COMMON PLEAS, LONDON.

An action for criminal conversation was tried on
Saturday morning. Major General Griffiths, plain-
tiff—Captain Brown of the 11th regt. of foot, defend-
ant. The parties became acquainted at Gibraltar.—
Mrs. Griffiths returned to England in 1816, and the
criminal intercourse took place at Southampton, where
she was joined by the defendant.

Verdict—Damages One Thousand Pounds.

SHERIFFS' COURT, BEDFORD ROW.

PROCTOR, Esq. v. STANDISH, Esq.—This was an
action to recover compensation for criminal cover-
sation with the plaintiff's wife. The defendant having
suffered judgment to go by default, the present inquiry
took place before the under sheriff and a special jury,
to assess the damages. The adultery took place in
Rome, in 1814.—Damages, Five Hundred Pounds.

COURT OF COMMON PLEAS.

VOUGHTON, v. FUEILLARD.—The plaintiff in this
case, a clerk in the banking house of Messrs. Marsh,
Sibbald and Co. brought an action against the defend-
ant, a dancing master, who is employed in teaching
some of the younger branches of the Royal household,
to recover compensation in damages, for criminal
conversation with his wife.—Damages, Five Hundred
Pounds.

COURT OF KING'S BENCH.

THE KING v. BUTT

The trial of the defendant, for writing and publish-
ing a false and infamous libel against Lord Ellenbo-
rough came on this morning before Mr. Justice Ab-
bott and a special jury. The court was extremely
crowded. On the bench were Lord Holland, the Chan-
cellor of the Exchequer, and the Lord Mayor. In the

Mr. Richardson opened the pleadings, and the case
was stated by the Attorney General, in a very elo-
quent speech. The defendant, and others, he observ-

against him.
Mr. Butt then said, he was incapable of publishing
a deliberate libel—and he was sure, when the jury
heard the evidence he would bring forward, that their
sentiments would coincide with his. It would be for
them to consider, not merely the fact of publication,
but, whether, under all circumstances, the paper
amounted to a libel or not. He should shew the jury
the just cause he had to placard judges and ministers
of state. He would prove that Lord Ellenborough had
made private use of the king's money, and that the
gaoler of the king's bench assisted him in the transac-
tion—and it could not be doubted, that the person
who made a private advantage of the king's money
ought to be exposed.

The defendant then proceeded to call witnesses, of
whom an immense number was in attendance. At
twelve o'clock this day he had examined W. Filewood,
one of the turnkeys of the king's bench, Thomas Gib-
bons, tipstaff to the court, the Hon. Mr. Bennett, Mr.
Fern, stock broker, and Mr. Bond, banker—but the
questions he put to the witnesses had no relation
whatever to the libel.

Mr. Butt was found 'Guilty'

The court then proceeded to try him for the libel
on Lord Castlereagh.
