WHITWORTH.

HEREAS, from the very high price of natmeal and Potatoes, which constitute the chief food of the lower orders of the people in this part of the United Kingdom, and the poverty which still prevainfrom want of employment amongst the labouring and manufacturing classes, it is expedient that those artroles of food should be, as far as possible, reserved. for the exclusive supply of the lower orders of the people.

Now we the Lord Lieutenant, by and with the advice of his Mejesty's Privy Council of Ireland, do earnestly exhort and recommend all masters of families, who are not in the lower classes of life, not to suffer any potatoes whatever to be consumed in their respective families. And we do also, in like manner, exhort and charge all persons who keep horses, especially horses for pleasure, to diminish as much as pos\_ sible the consumption of oats in their subsistance --And as we do hereby bind ourselves to the observonce of the above regulations, we do exhort and charge all

immediate interests, and feel for the wants of others: And we do hereby further direct, that the above mentioned resolution of council be transmitted to all governors of counties, and chief magistrates of the principal towns; that the archbishops and bishops in their several provinces and dioceses be desired to transa mit the same to their clergy, in order that the ob. servance thereof may be recommended in the different parishes throughout the country.

WHITWORTH. THEREAS by an act of patliament passed in the If ty fourth year of his present Majesty, en. titled " An act to provide for the better execution of the laws in Ireland, by appointing superintending magistrates and additional constables in counties in certain cases," it is, amongst other things enacted. that it shall be lawful for the Lord Lieutenant, or other chief governor or governors of Ireland, for the time being, by the advice of the privy council of Ireland, to declare by proclemation that any county. county of a city, or county of a town in Ireland, or any barony or baronies, or any balf barony or half, baronies in any county at large, to be therein speci\_ Red, is or are in a state of distorbance, and requires or require an extraordinary establishment of police.

And whereas it has sufficiently appeared to us, that the barony of Buntatly, in the county of Clare, is in a state of disturbance, and requires an extraordinary

establishment of police. Now we, the Lord Lieutenant, by and with the advice of his Majesty's privy council, by virtue of the said act, and the powers thereby vested in us, do by this our proclamation declare, that the said harony of Bunratty, in the County of Clare, in this part of the United Kingdom called Ireland, is in a state of disturbance, and requires an extraordinary catablishment of Police.
