Cashel to Kilkenny.
An association is now formed, or forming in the town of
Wenagh, for which a detachment of the Nenagh light infantry
have received 200 stand of arms.
A general order has been transmitted by order of govern-
ment, to the collectors of customs, directing them to permit
the importation of corn, grain, meal, flour, and rice, in any
ship, from any country, until the 14th of Nov. provided the
importation of grain shall during that period continue legal
under the provisions of the act of 55. Geo. III. and to give
notice thereof immediately.

Gort and its vicinity have been disturbed in a manner simi-
lar to this city, Cork, &c.—a supply of potatoes for the poor
restored order.

Nearly 8,000 barrels of American flour have recently been
received in Cork, and amazing large supplies in Dublin and
Liverpool. It is a proof that there is no scarcity of flour in
England when in the last week, 26,000 barrels were ex-
ported from Liverpool for France.

Tranquillity has been perfectly restored in Waterford,
where the loss on the sale of oats and oatmeal to the poor, at
the reduced price, amounts to £1 500 per month—Water-
ford has sufficient of these articles for four months to come.

The appointment of the Rev. Dr. Walsh of Dungarvan to
the Roman Catholic See of Waterford, vacant by demise of
the late Rev. Dr. Power, took place at Rome on the 19th of
May.

Thursday last, the Archbishop of Cashel held his annual
visitation for that diocese.

“Dublin Castle, 17th June, 1817.

“My Lord—It appearing from reports which have been
lately submitted to the Lord Lieutenant, through the Com-
mander of the Forces, from Major General O’Loughlin, on
the state of the peace of the city of Limerick, that he has
experienced from your Lordship, as well as from the disem-
bodied staffs of the County and City Limerick regiments, the
most active and zealous co-operation. I am commended by
his Excellency, to acquaint your Lordship, that he has derived
great satisfaction from finding that no further efforts have been
made to interrupt the Public Peace in the City of Limerick.

“And he has directed me, at the same time, to express his
sense of your Lordship’s exertions on the occasion; and of
the promptness and alacrity with which the Officers and Staff
of the Militia have come forward in the present instance, to
aid the civil power in support of the laws.

“His Excellency, therefore, desires that your Lordship
would make known to these Detachments, the opinion he en-
tertains of their laudable conduct.
