what could induce his Reporter to substitute falsehoods for his words he was at a loss to conjecture—He cer- tainly has acquitted you in a gentlemanly manner, but he has thrown an imputation on me, that I have by no means deserved—In some particulars it might have been incorrect—Mr. White has said it was, and though he has had the kindness to accuse me of falsehood, I will not, by denying his allegation, impute that crime to him.—But, I can, at the same time, assure Mr. White, in the most unequivocal manner, that I detest a falsehood as much he does.

Had Mr. White's language been changed in point and effect from that which he uttered, he might with justice have complained—but that happens not to be the case.—If it varied in some respect, the noise of an election court would plead my apology for having mis-conceived his expressions, and I would have felt myself bound to correct my unintentional error by any dictation which Mr. W. might think proper to suggest. But he proceeds at once to level a charge of false- hood, without any modification, on a person whom he knows not, and to whom Mr. W. was unknown.

He feels at a loss to conjecture what were my motives—so indeed he may, under the circumstances I have already stated—However, Mr. W. and the Public may be able to judge what motive actuated me, when in transcribing that part of his speech which alluded to some trouble he had been in, I omitted it altogether, from a respect to his feelings, which I was unwilling to wound—If this delicate omission, and perhaps a few trivial and certainly unintentional errors, have merited the unkind charge which Mr. White has made, I shall submit, and leave the public to decide.
