The above are submitted to the public for consideration, and we are of opinion, that the subject demands the closest investigation.—The assiduity of the persons who have the superintendance of public Bakeries will be insufficient if they are not aided by the people in general. The consumption of bread in a large and populous city, such as Limerick, must be enormous, and it is a known fact, that notwithstanding every effort to prevent it the grossest peculation still continues, and the citizens are defrauded of a large sum annually. The quality as well as the weight needs to be consulted, and perhaps is of far greater importance—a great deal of that which is offered for sale by the petty bakers is extremely bad, possesses but little nutriment, and must be very destructive to health.

Two cases of very great importance to the Mercantile world, came on to tried in the city court, Waterford, before the Hon. Baron George and a special Jury. The case is, we believe, perfectly unprecedented in the annals of commerce. The trial occupied the entire of three days.

The first was an action of *assumpsit*, for money received, and the object of it was to recover two several sums of money, viz. £1417 5s the produce of the sale of 300 barrels of flour, part of the cargo of the ship Oscar, wrecked at Tramore, which defendant sold to reimburse himself for the expenses which he alleged he had incurred in saving and storing said cargo—and £900, paid to him as commission, at the rate of 5 per cent. on the total value of the cargo. The other was an action of *trover*, to recover the value of 38½ barrels of flour, alleged to remain unaccounted for by the defendant, and of 24 barrels, which remained in the hull of the vessel, when all was supposed to have been discharged, and which defendant alleged he had a right to keep, having purchased the hull as it lay. In the latter action, the jury found for the plaintiffs, £171 17s 6d. damages, and 6d. costs. In the former, not being able to agree upon any determinate rate of commission, they returned a special finding for the plaintiff, suggested by Baron George, for the sum of £679 9s, 0½d (being the excess over the rate of 1½ per cent. & including a balance of £4 9s 0½d the difference between the disbursements and the proceeds of the 300 barrels) and costs; leaving the court above at liberty to enter up a non-suit against the plaintiff, if they shall be of opinion that the defendant was entitled to five per cent. commission on the cargo.
