

TIPPERARY ASSIZES.—On Monday, (24th ult) at noon, our Assizes commenced, the Right Hon. the Chief Baron presiding in the Record Court, and Baron George in the Crown side. The Commission having been read, the following most respectable Grand Jury was sworn:—

Richard Butler Hamilton Low, Esq. Foreman; Hon. General O'Callaghan; Hon. Peter Count D'Alton. Richard Waller, Pierce Archer Butler, John Meagher, James Scully, Oliver Latham, Richard Millett, Andrew O'Ryan, Charles Langley, William Quin, Thomas Clutterbuck, William Harden Bradshaw, Richard Long, and Benjamin Bradshaw, Esqrs.

The Assizes of Enniskillen commenced on Tuesday, before the Honourable Justices Day and Fletcher, the former presiding in the crown and the latter in the record court.

The Assizes of Cavan commenced on Thursday week, and terminated on Saturday. The calendar was extremely heavy, but a great number of prisoners were discharged for want of prosecution. There were three capital convictions for robbery.

The County of Monaghan Assizes commenced on yesterday se'night, before the Honourable Mr. Justice Osborne in the crown court, and the Honourable Baron McClelland in the civil bill court.

At Hertford Assizes, William Moles was found guilty of setting fire to a stack of wheat, whereby the said stack, together with other property to the amount of one thousand pounds, belonging to John Farn, was destroyed. It appeared that the prisoner had been the servant of the prosecutor, and had taken this mode of avenging himself for a quarrel.—*Death*

At Nottingham Assizes, Charles Rotherham was convicted of the murder of Elizabeth Sheppard, at Sutton-in-Ashfield. The deceased was an interesting girl of seventeen, whom the prisoner knocked down with a hedge stake, and continued inhumanity to beat her until she expired. He then rifled her of her shoes and an umbrella, and threw her bleeding and disfigured body into a ditch. A few minutes after perpetrating this atrocious deed, the murderer passed the mother of his victim, who had come out to meet her daughter on her return home! The prisoner on being apprehended, confessed the crime, and declared that he could not tell what had tempted him to the commission of it. He was sentenced to be executed on Monday se'night.

At Lincoln Assizes, Elizabeth Warriner was found guilty of poisoning her step son.

Patrick Hickey, one of the men concerned in the robbery of the Rev. F. Blood, of Roxton, and convicted at last Bonis Assizes, together with John Coffee, sen. and John Coffee jun. convicted of sheep-stealing, have had their sentence commuted to transportation for life.

The Right Rev. the Lord Bishop of Killaloe held a meeting of the parishioners of Ennis, on Wednesday, for the purpose of considering the expediency of building a new church in that town, the old one being in a state of ruin.—The lands of Park have been fixed on as a site for the new church.

The 36th Regiment have embarked at Portsmouth for the Mediterranean.

The 1st battalion 68th regiment was embarking at Calcutta on the 20th of February, for St. Helena, to replace the 2d battalion of that regiment, and the 2d battalion 53d regiment, which are to be disbanded: the effective men of the 53d will go to India, to be incorporated with the 1st battalion.

The 25th regt. are now quartered at Portsmouth.

The Earl of Kingston is at present at Corkabeg, Lord Kingsborough, the new candidate for Cork, in England, and the Hon. Mr. Here, his opponent, at Canvamore.

It is now said that the Duke of Devonshire's interest will be given to Lord Kingsborough in the county Cork.

The Barony of Enniskillen, county Donegal, is placed under the peace preservation act.

Martin Connors of Killaloe, school master, was committed to Ennis jail on Tuesday last, for assaulting and robbing on the highway near Killaloe, one Michael Scalan, farmer.

We have authority in stating, that the Lord Bishop of Cloyne, following the example of the neighboring Bishops, will dispense with the attendance of his clergy at his visitation this year.—*Cork Chronicle*.

On Tuesday last, the Right Hon. the Earl of Shannon was unanimously elected Recorder of the town of Youghal, to succeed his late uncle, the Right Hon. George Ponsonby, deceased.

Sir Francis Biddell arrived in Dublin from Holyhead on Friday last—he is come it is said, to attend the trial of Roger O'Connor, Esq.

Lord Francis Conyngham means to offer himself as Candidate for the representation of the county Clare, at the next general election.—*See advt.*

Wednesday evening, Colonel Crosbie, M. P. arrived in Tralee, on his return to his seat at Ballyheigue Castle, from attending his duty in Parliament as one of the representatives for the county Kerry.

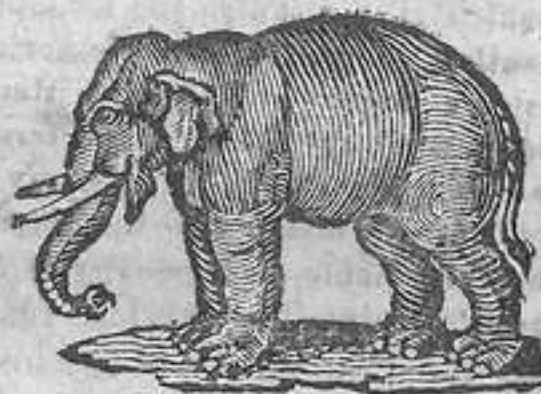
