LINEN TRADE.—We have been informed (says the
Newry Telegraph.) that an act of parliament has passed
the legislature, by which French cambricks and lawns,
are to be admitted into these countries, on paying the
following duties:—

From and after the 11th of August, 1817. foreign
cambricks and lawns, commonly called French cam-
bricks, the pieces not exceeding 8 yards, by $\frac{3}{8}$ wide,
11s. 0d. per piece.

Exceeding 8 yards, and $\frac{3}{8}$ the breadth, the piece, and
in that proportion for a greater or less quantity
14s. 4d.

LAWNS—Silesia, and all other lawns, except French

ceeding 8 yards, 7s. 8d. per piece.

Silesia, and all other lawns, bleached in Holland, the
piece not exceeding 8 yards, 9s. 7d. per piece. Du-

in some places, (indeed very few) are lodged, but the general
aspect is favourable.—Potatoes have been taken up too early,
on account of the scarcity of the old, and the exorbitant price
demanded by the holders.—Occasional showers can affect the
Harvest but little, as an hour's sunshine does away the damp.—
The crop will be most abundant and of admirable quality
should the weather hold up.
