LINEN TRADE.—We have been informed (says the Newry Telegraph.) that an act of parliament has passed the legislature, by which French cambricks and lawns, are to be admitted into these countries, on paying the following duties:—

From and after the 11th of August, 1817, foreigh cambricks and lawns, commonly called French combricks, the pieces not exceeding 8 yards, by & wide,

Exceeding 8 yards, and & the breadth, the piece, and in that proportion for a greater or less quantity

Lawns - Silesia, and all other lawns, except French lawns-not bleached in Holland, the piece not exceeding 8 yards, 7s. 8d. per piece.

Silesia, and all other lawns, bleached in Holland, the piece not exceeding 8 yards, 9s. 7d. per piece. Dusties all British money.
