

Mr. A. O'Connor has prepared a plate which will be given to the public in a few days, in the shape of a pamphlet. It is said to be a very eloquent production: A prosecution has been commenced against Owens and Warren for perjury. Yesterday the *Anne & Independence*, from Dublin, arrived with passengers. In the *Anne*, were Mr. Philipps, Mr. and Mrs. T. H. Quinlan, and other persons of respectability of that city. Mr. Blake, Esq. has been appointed one of the Justices of the Peace for the Corporation of Galway. The room of James O'Hara, Esq. of whose services the Public are not deprived by this desirable appointment, as the recorder still continues Justice of the Peace, to all intents & purposes. Yesterday last, by the falling of ground at the well in Batchelor's Walk, Dublin—Three persons were unfortunately suffocated.

**Engines.**—An American journal mentions a great improvement of the steam engine, by all accidents may be prevented in future. An improvement was invented by David Heath, jun. of Jersey, and consists in a new contrivance of a boiler, by which a high temperature of steam is produced without the use of the condenser; besides the balance wheel and the beam are rendered unnecessary, so that through this invention a whole steam of four horse power is reduced to the small space of 60 cubic feet.

The Royal Society of Edinburgh on the 19th of August, by Mr. Stevenson, civil engineer, was engaged in the operation of the waters of the River Dee, in the basin or harbour of Aberdeen, from which it appears, that Mr. Stevenson had been able to lift salt water from the bottom, while it was quite fresh at the surface, and he has ascertained that the tidal or salt water is in a distinct stratum or layer under the fresh water.

The Lord Lieutenant has been pleased to remit a sum of £80 to Mr. Brownlow, for the relief of the poor in and about Lurgan.

Clare Sessions will commence at Kilmurry, on Monday, and at Ennis, on Wednesday the 15th days of next month.

Yesterday, a large quantity of oats, this year's growth, of Jonas Studdert, of Claremount, Esq. appeared in the market—the grain was in excellent condition.

It is informed that a man named Robinson, an out of the 54th regt. having a dispute with his wife, near Sunday evening, was intreated to desist from the same by John Moran, a brother pensioner, which so enraged the former, that he plunged a knife into Moran's back, causing immediate death.—Robinson has absconded. The 16th lancers at Trim, have proceeded for the night to Dublin.

The Rev. George Maddox, being deputed as his Grace the Archbishop of Cashel, arrived in Dublin, and proceeded to the Cathedral, where he read his commands, postponing his visitation of the clergy to the next year, which was expected to be held this year, to the 18th—Mr. Maddox attended at Killaloe on Saturday, and postponed the assemblage of that diocese, until about the 1st of next month.

It is intimated that the Excise Commissioners are to be reduced to five, who are C. S. Hawthorne, John Longfield, Thomas Odell, and Sir Robert Barrington.

A reduction is also rumoured to occur in the number of the five senior commissioners are, Lord Right Hon. J. O. Vandeleur, Robert Wynne, Hutchinson, and Hon John Jocelyn.

A ship from Philadelphia with flour, arrived at Cork yesterday.

The Government issued money for pensions of officers residing in Ireland, and which began to be paid yesterday.
