

INTELLIGENCE.

RECEIVING THE NEW LORD LIEUTENANT.

The Lord Lieutenant, being CHARLES CRETWYND, is humbly submitted: to be received at the Pigeon-house to the presence of the appearance of the Secretary of State, who will be his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant.
