MAYORALTY OF LONDON.

The election of a Lord Mayor for the city of London, is carried on with great activity, and exhibits the exertions of party zeal and spirit in their highest energy. The present Lord Mayor is the popular candidate, or, in other words, has the crowd on his side; but he stood lower on the Poll than his opponents, Aldermen Smith and Atkins, at the latest period to which one of our private correspondents has reported the proceedings. If he should be successful, and fill the civic chair a third time, the circumstance, we believe, would be without precedent. The chances, however, appear unfavorable to his re-election. It is obviously the efforts of a party, which struggle to continue his authority against the usual rules of the Corporation—and that party has in it some personages of no inconsiderable notoriety.

CITY MAGISTRATES.

Yesterday, being the first Monday after Michaelmas day, and the swearing day of the Corporation of this City, our late respected and esteemed Chief Magistrate, John Vereker, Esq. took the oaths as Mayor for the ensuing year, being his third election to the Civic Chair—Perhaps no Gentleman who preceded him, had to contend with greater difficulties in the discharge of the important duties attached thereto, particularly in the last year—a year of unexampled scarcity, and none could have combatted them more successfully than he has done—in the most alarming moments, he was cool and collected—the authority of office, was the only means he resorted to, to quell disturbances, and he may pride himself on the attention which has generally been paid to his orders, without the assistance of a military power to enforce them—his attention to the wants of the poor have been most beneficial to them—no means which could soften their distresses or mitigate their sufferings were left unresorted to, and his relinquishment of the fees of office, bespeaks a liberality and goodness of Heart, which we would be glad to find imitated—To descant generally on his public virtues may be unnecessary, and we cannot more powerfully eulogise them than by saying, that his third election to the office of Mayor was by the general voice of the citizens, conveyed to the Common Council, by petition—This is as it ought to be—the voice of the people should be first heard, and if found to be conducive to the public weal, no private interest should interfere to prevent its accomplishment—When the interior government of a state or of a city is committed to the guidance of just, honest and honorable men, harmony, satisfaction, and constitu-
