Lord Bernard one of the present Representatives of the county, has declined standing at the next general election for the county. We understand that Sir Gregory Page Turner is shortly to lead to the altar, the Hon. Miss Hawke, sister to the present Lord Hawke.

Earl Talbot, who is appointed to succeed our present amiable Viceroy, in the government of this country, was expected to arrive at the Castle on Monday, and the necessary preparations for his reception were accordingly made: an express, however, arrived on Sunday afternoon, stating, that unforeseen circumstances had occurred, which would prevent his Lordship's arrival for some days—He was expected to reach this country yesterday or this day.

Mr. Bald has been appointed surveyor of the county Mayo, under the grand jury bill of the last session of parliament, which will come into operation on the 1st of next month. The remains of the Dowager Marchioness of Sligo arrived on Friday evening at Barnet, from the Continent, and are to be interred in the family vault, Porters Lodge, Hertis. Mr. and Mrs. Wellealey Poic, who are arrived in Paris, are expected to return to England the beginning of next month. His Grace the Lord Primate and family, Major General Lord Blaney, Francis Savage, Esq. and Lady Harriet Savage, have arrived in Dublin.

The Right Hon. Earl of Clare has left England for France. The celebrated Mrs. Fitzherbert, well known in England, has arrived in Paris where she remains for a few weeks. Lord Charles Fitzroy has left London for Suffolk, and Mrs. M. Burgoyne for Essex. Mr. Polito, the other day, puffing his Ourang Outang, by a figure of rhetoric which in Ireland would be called a Bull, described it as "the link which separated the human race from the brute creation!"

Lord Anson has presented the Rev. Wm. Hicken to the perpetual curacy of Ellenhall, in Staffordshire. The Tramore Races this year are expected to be numerously attended, and to afford the most satisfactory sport and amusement. Monday last, Thomas Gibbings, Esq. took the usual oaths as Mayor, and Thomas W. Newsom and Samuel Lane, Esqs. as Sheriffs of Cork, for the ensuing year. A dreadful fire broke out on Sunday morning, between one and two o'clock, in John street, Thomas street; it commenced in the stables of Mrs. Nowlan, of New row, Dublin, and burst with so much violence that two horses were destroyed.

In order to counteract the effects of fever in Dublin Mr. Peel has signified to the governors of the House of Industry, that it is the intention of the executive government to appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of cleansing and whitewashing the houses of the poorer classes of the inhabitants, and, in order to afford the most effectual relief, they desire that a return may be made of the sick in the metropolis. At the Old Baily sessions, London, there have been 120 convictions—200 remain to be tried.

CROPS—MARKETS, &

The harvest continues in such a prosperous state as to have lowered the price of Home Spirits considerably last week in Dublin. From the certainty of the distillerie being soon set to work, those who held over large stocks of spirits on speculation, will, thereby, be seriously disappointed.—*Hibernian Journal.* The counties of Leicestershire and Cheshire, which in general plant a greater breadth of land with potatoes than any three counties in England, have, this year, nearly a double crop of that excellent vegetable. Wonderful produce of a single grain of oats, which hath grown in the midst of a field of the same kind of grain, near Warrenpoint. There were eleven stalks out of the one grain: The first stalk which was counted had 43 grains on it—The second, do. 49—The third, do. 114—The fourth, do. 100—The fifth, do. 116—The sixth, do. 48—The seventh, do. 80—The eighth, do. 107—The ninth, do. 133—The tenth, do. 81—The eleventh, do. 96—Total amount 967. The land sales which have taken place in this part of the country lately, have been on terms which indicate a returning regard to real property. It seems no longer difficult to sell. There was an auction in this town last week of several estates in several neighbouring parishes, and property in general is thought to have sold well.—*Stamford Mercury.* The price of potatoes at Glasgow is 44lbs. for 6d. —at Edinburgh, 28lbs. for 8d.

We had a short supply of all descriptions of grain at today's market, as well as American Flour. Prime samples of foreign Wheat were in great request at full 1s. per bushel advance; good Barley was likewise in demand, and is 9s. per bushel higher. Sweet American Flour is become scarce, and was bought with avidity at 8s. per barrel more than on last Tuesday. Old and new Oats caught the attention of some of the country dealers, and being below the average of either Wheat or Flour, extensive sales might have been made at our last quotations. Malt was a trifle lower.
