

ARRIVAL OF EARL TALBOT.

Wednesday se'night, Earl Talbot left his seat at Incestric, and passed through Stafford, on his way, (viz. Shrewsbury) to Holyhead, there to embark for Ireland.

On Wednesday, at two in the afternoon, Earl Talbot sailed from Holyhead, and arrived on Saturday morning, at an early hour, in the Bay of Dublin, where his Lordship remained, until the arrangements were made for the ceremonial of his reception.

On his Lordship's landing, he was received, in the manner, as directed by the proper authority and as described in the *Limerick Advertiser* of the 16th ult. His Lordship entered the town by Mount street, and proceeded along Merrion square, Nassau street, Col. go green, Dame street, &c. which were lined by the military of the garrison of Dublin; and upon his arrival at the Castle, within a quarter of five o'clock, his Lordship was conducted, after his introduction to Earl Whitworth, to the Council Chamber, where his Lordship was, with the usual formalities, sworn into office as Viceroy of this Kingdom. The town was greatly crowded, all the nobility and gentry having come in to witness a spectacle so highly interesting.

The following were the arrangements of the military:—The Queen's Lancers were on the right, on the north side of Merrion square, and down Mount street: the infantry regiments, according to seniority, formed flanks to the centre, lining the streets, on each side, to the Castle, where the whole terminated with the 4th dragoon guards. On the S side of Merrion square, a part of the 27th regt. formed a saluting party, and fired three volleys, in the intervals between three rounds of twenty one pieces of cannon, which were discharged from the battery in the Park. There was a preparatory salute from the Park battery on the landing of Earl Talbot being announced. A guard of honor of the 4th dragoon guards, under the command of a field officer, escorted his Excellency from the Pigeon house to the Castle.

The constituted authorities, civil and military, went down in procession to receive Lord Talbot, and accompanied him to Dublin Castle.

After his Excellency had been sworn in, he set off for the Vice Regal Lodge in the Phoenix Park, where a grand dinner, in honor of the occasion, was given by Earl Whitworth. Amongst the company were the following distinguished personages:—

THE ARMY.

The 16th regt. lately quartered here, commanded by Col. Tully, were inspected at Kilkenny on Tuesday, by General Doyle, who expressed himself highly pleased with their fine military appearance.

The following regts. have been ordered to be disbanded:—2d bat. 53d, 2d bat. 66th, 5th and 6th West India, 3d Ceylon, and the Garrison Company in the West Indies. The 80th regt. was reduced in establishment 25th Aug.

Major Morrison's company of royal artillery (now in Portsmouth garrison) is to embark for Malta.

The 2d bat. 53d regt from St. Helena, have joined the depot at Canterbury.

The 21st regt (Royal Scots Fusiliers) have marched for Dudley, where it is to be quartered during the winter.

Three hundred officers and men of the Royals are now on their march from Enniskillen for Fermoy, previous to proceeding to join their battalions in India.

Captain F. Mosse is appointed aide camp to Major General Gordon at Cork, vice O'Brien, rifle brigade.

The Waterloo Committee have added £10,000 to the fund already remitted to the Hanoverian Government, for the troops engaged in that memorable battle.

LIMERICK.—The continuance of fine weather with which Providence has graciously favoured us, has enabled the farmer to cut and carry home his crops in safety—Oats and Barley will be most particularly abundant—the supply of Wheat is not in an equal proportion, though there will certainly be more than sufficient for home consumption.

Wheat, 1s 6d to 2s 3d Oats, 10d Barley 1s—Butter, Butter, 98, 92, 82, 72.

CORK.—Our accounts from the country during the last week are extremely favourable, the weather has been dry, tho' cold, and much has been done in the way of cutting and stacking. Very little Wheat is now standing—The Barley is nearly all saved, but a considerable portion of Oats unripe. The Potato stalks have been withered and burned by the frosts, but the root has sustained no injury.—Another fortnight of such weather as we have would complete the harvest.
