A poor fellow, a hair dresser from Edinburgh, going to Dumfries in quest of work, having got up behind the carriage, unknown to the coachman, and attempting to leap off, at the time of the accident, had his clothes so entangled about the springs, that he was dragged along the road for a considerable space, and received very serious injury. Fortunately a surgeon was at hand, and the broken limb being properly set, the coachman is in a fair way of recovery.
