scarce, and it is calculated that the limited stock is
inadequate to the usual demand of the season.—
Bacon is still very heavy.—There has been consi-
derable parcels of Irish butter taken on specula-
tion; the prices are considerably higher, and a ge-
neral report is circulated (for which there appears
little foundation), that the make is very deficient
of an average quantity.

MY LORDS AND GENTLEMEN,

PERMIT me to return you my warmest acknow-
ledgments, for the distinguished support you
gave me on Monday last.

Although my opponent had advantages which he
turned to account, the resignation of the other Can-
didates being known to him, but sedulously kept from
me; although Mr. John Gabbett's 'resignation,' Mr.
Pool Gabbett's 'Address,' and Mr. Wall's 'Writ,' were
issued at the same 'time,' and from the same 'party,'
yet, I have to congratulate my 'County' on the many
proof of 'Independence' it shewed at this Election.

Mr. Pool Gabbett may boast of a 'Majority,' but
