LONDON CORN EXCHANGE, Oct. 22.—The supply of wheat this morning being small, what appeared of quality was readily disposed of at Monday's prices—Barley was not so brisk in demand as on Monday; although the arrival was but trifling, yet prime samples support their prices; but the inferior descriptions are unsaleable. In peas, beans, and oats, no alteration.

DUBLIN—Our supply of grain on Friday was large, and as usual lately. Oats predominated in quantity; the demand for butter was very limited, and the price went further down; the general rates 12 to 14s; wheat on the contrary was in request, and prices rated from 47 to 54s; barley more plenty, and fine descriptions met a ready sale at 28s; inferior 20s to 24s; old oats are getting scarce, and such as are suitable for feeding, worth 20s per barrel; no alteration in flour; the stock of American is now very small—such as are sweet and fine, brings readily 68s; sour, 52s to 54s.

BELFAST—Wheat per cwt 14s 9d to 15s; barley 7s 7d to 9s; oats 7s 6d to 8s 6d; flower first (old) 34s; second ditto 31s; oatmeal (new) 13s to 14s 6d; potatoes per stone 3d; beef per lb 3d to 5d; mutton 5d to 7d.

CLONMEL—Oatmeal per cwt 16s; flower, second per bag 54s; third ditto 46s; wheat per stone 1s 11d; oats 10d; potatoes 3d per stone; beef per lb 3½d to 5d;

 - Resolved—That after the first hundred shall have subscribed their names and paid their subscriptions, that no person shall be admitted but by ballot of the Members present, one black bean in five to exclude from admission. That such Candidate for admission shall be proposed and seconded by two members, with a notice of one week in the usual way, and a deposit of his subscription made with the Treasurer before ballot, to be returned, if not admitted.
