MY LORDS AND GENTLEMEN,

IT was my intention not to trouble you, until I re- ceived an opinion, on the 'legality' of the Elec- tion of the '20th October;' but finding that Mr. Pool Gabbett is again on the Canvass, and preparing to come to the post 'under different views,' I must there- fore with great respect obtrude myself on your thoughts.

When I had the honor of canvassing you, I sought no means but what were 'open' and 'honorable.' I checked as far as lay in me, an injury and insult in- tended against you, by preventing the 'underhand traffic' of your 'dearest rights,' if in thus doing, I evinced an over ardent zeal, or committed 'any' error, the motive will, I trust, excuse me; in, on the con- trary, you think favorable of my efforts, in upholding your free and open voices, and that I receive, the addition of a 'single voice' on the next Election will amply repay me.

When I take the disinterested view a 'free Elector ought' of the last Election, 'and of what took place in the Court House,' and when I consider what at- tempts were made to twist and turn the Electors, by a variety of applications from a variety of Candidates, I do rejoice in common with many of the Electors, at the immediate prospect of a new Election; all will then come to the Hustings, better prepared, and free from pledges given, at a time they knew not the Can- didates.

I would therefore propose with the intent of meeting the wishes of all, and of upholding a free and open choice, that all the Magistrates do hold themselves 'disengaged' until the day of 'Election,' and I pledge myself, (should they think any other person better qualified than Mr. Gabbett or me) to support him

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
