the trustees think proper to do so, I conceive that a court of equity at the suit of the body, in behalf of themselves and of the other mem- bers of the association, would on a bill filed, or a pe- tion under the late act of parliament, compel the trustees to fulfil the trusts reposed in them, and re- train them from giving the use of the chapels, to the dissenters from the original association; at the same time I should rather recommend to let the case come forward when the dissenting preachers may be plain- tiffs or petitioners, and the trustees defendants.

If there be any of the Preachers composing the conference, however inconsiderable the minority, who adhere to the original plan, and do not concur in de- parture from it, adopted by the majority, I recom- mend that they should act, as if they and they only composed the conference, being under the circum- stances as I conceive, the only legitimate conference, the other Preachers having abdicated and ceased to be any longer members of it.

I should hope, that in the Derry case, now before the Master of the Rolls, a favourable decision may be had; if in the mean time, the Preachers and other members of the body, who are yielding to the spirit of innovation and division, may not think it better to restore peace and harmony to the society, and ad- here strictly to the original plan, from which, if any departure be once admitted, others from the same cause and the same source will no doubt, inevitably follow.
