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In the long depending cause in the Court of Chan-
 cery, instituted against J. Bennett, Esq. of Viewmount
 near Carlow, on his guardianship transaction with the
 young Mr. Bernards, the Lord Chancellor, after a
 hearing of some hours, on Friday last, was pleased to
 dismiss the case with full costs; and highly compli-
 mented Mr. Bennett for his justice, integrity, and zeal,
 in the discharge of his duty, as guardian to the Bernard
 family.

The Lord Chancellor has been pleased to appoint
 Samuel Bennett, Esq. of Bennett's Grove, a Justice of
 the Peace and Quorum for the County of Cork.

The number of bales of cotton exported from the
 United States this year, ending September, is 1,142,384.

It is said that a further reduction will take place in
 the General Officers on the Staff in the West Indies.—
 There are now four Major-Generals employed there,
 one at each of the following Islands, viz—Grenada,
 where half of a regiment is stationed; Antigua, where
 five regiments are; at Tobago, where only two com-
 panies are; and at Demerara, besides a Commander of
 the Forces at Barbadoes. The Governor of St. Lucia,
 who is a Major General, is not retained on the Staff.
 The Staff of the Adjutant and Quarter-Master-Gen-
 in the West Indies have been very much reduced; as
 also the Commissariat.

Sir John Cox Hippesley, Bart. is safely arrived in Rome.
 On Friday a respectable Meeting was held of
 the parishioners of St. Mary's Shandon, Cork,
 when it was resolved unanimously that a requis-
 tion be presented by the Rev. John Quarry, on
 behalf of the parish, to the Mayor, requesting him
 to convene an immediate meeting of the citizens,
 for the purpose of forwarding a strong memorial
 to his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant, expressive
 of the utter inability of the inhabitants of Cork &
 its vicinity, to relieve the wide extending distress
 and sickness which now so alarmingly prevails, &
 which, unless immediately met with effectual aid
 from government, threatens the most dreadful con-
 sequences.

The requisition pointed out the necessity of one
 or two competent gentlemen being deputed by the
 general meeting, to present the memorial to the
 Lord Lieutenant, that he or they may be prepar-
 ed to answer such questions, or to point out such
 means of relief, as may be deemed most advisable.
 It was suggested, but not embodied in the requis-
 tion, that in case the Lord Lieutenant's powers
 were not adequate to the emergency of the case,
 that the deputation should be empowered to soli-
 cit his Excellency's humane and powerful recom-
 mendation to the Prince Regent, for the required
 relief, and that the person or persons solicited for
 the purpose, should be instructed to proceed from
 Dublin to London, to solicit the royal bounty to
 aid the strenuous exertions of the humane in effec-
 tually checking distress and disease of such long
 continuance, and which had been so fatal in their
 progress.
