Wednesday, in consequence of some opposition
given to John Molony, Esq. High Constable for
the barony of Tulla, he took out a few of the 93d
regt. stationed at Scarriff, and proceeded on his
levy. He was soon opposed by a vast multitude,
and at length compelled to order the soldiery to
fire. This dreadful alternative was not resorted to
until Mr. Molony and his small party had been sur-
rounded by upwards of 300 enraged assailants.—
The consequence of this illegal resistance has
proved fatal. The army were compelled to fire,
and, we are concerned to close this article by stat-
ing, that three men were killed, and two danger-

island of St. Helena. Countess Dillon was the relict of
the Honourable Arthur Dillon, lieutenant general and
colonel proprietor of the Irish brigade regiment, bear-
ing his name in the service of France, and brother to
the late Charles Viscount Dillon, and the Honourable
Dowager Lady Birmingham. Few persons had suffer-
ed greater domestic afflictions than this lady; her hus-
band, Gen. Dillon, to whom she was tenderly attached,
perished in 1793, upon the scaffold, among the crowd
of victims immolated to the demon of Revolutionary
France; her favourite daughter, the late Duchess of
Fitzjames, fell an early victim to consumption; and
she lived to witness the perpetual exile of her sole
remaining daughter, under circumstances which pre-
cluded even the consolation of complaint.—At

children, & twenty nine great grand children, in all 96.—
