FEVER HOSPITAL.

At a General Meeting of the Governors of the Fever and Lock Hospital, held on Monday last, pursuant to public notice in the Limerick Newspaper;

The Lord Bishop of Limerick in the Chair,

GOVERNORS PRESENT:

The Mayor of Limerick, the Dean of Limerick, the Collector of Limerick, Joseph M. Harvey, Wm. Hill, John Barry, Francis H. Bindon, Thomas Mark, George E. The Treasurer reported, that from the 5th of January last, to the 5th inst. there have been admitted,

The Treasurer further reported, that the Committee had lately purchased the Tenant's interest in a plot of ground adjoining the Hospital premises, (without waiting for a meeting of the Governors) to obviate as much as possible, the spreading of contagion; on which plot of ground, there are two old houses, now fitted up as convalescent rooms—that the sum of £13 had been paid for the interest, and that a further sum of £40 must be laid out, for including said grounds; in consequence of this purchase, the committee has been enabled to accommodate already, 48 convalescent patients, and hopes shortly to accommodate as many more.

The Physicians of the Hospital reported that they had visited within the last three or four days upwards of seventy persons in typhus fever in their own habitations, who, for want of further accommodation, could not be admitted into the Hospital.

From the foregoing statement it appears that a debt is now actually due by the Hospital, to the amount of £104; that a further debt of about £140 must necessarily be incurred before the close of the year or 5th Jan. next; so that at that period a debt of about £244 will be due of the Hospital—nor will any of its regular income become due, except £100 from his Majesty's Treasury, until after next Assizes.

The following Resolutions were proposed by the Mayor, and seconded by the Collector:—

Resolved unanimously—That our chairman be requested to lay the case of this Hospital before his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant, praying such further aid as his Excellency may see fit to grant, to enable the Governors, under the blessing of God, to check the further spread of this most alarming and still very prevalent disease, and to provide more extensive accommodation for the present and future patients of the Hospital.

Resolved—That the warmest thanks of the Governors be returned to the inhabitants of this city, for their most timely and liberal aid hitherto afforded, whereby the Governors have been enabled, far beyond their most sanguine expectations, to extend the benefit of this Institution.
