FEVER HOSPITAL.

T a General Meeting of the Governors of the Fever and Lock Hospital, held on Monday last, pursuant to public notice in the Limerick Newspapers,

The Lord Bishop of Limerick in the Chair, GOVERNORS PRESENT :

The Mayor of Limerick, the Dean of Limerick, the Collector of Limerick, Joseph M. Harvey, Wm. Hill. John Barry, Francis H. Bindon, Thomas Mark, George E. That the outstanding debts amount to £469 0 0 The Treasurer further reported, that the Cotamittee had lately purchased the Tenant's interest in a plot of ground adjoining the Hospital premises, (without waiting for a meeting of the Governors) to abviate as much as possible, the spreading of contagion; on which plat of ground; there are two old houses, now fitted up as convalescent rooms—that the sum of \$13 had been paid for the interest, and that a further som of \$240 must be laid out, for inclusing said ground; in consequence of this purchase, the committee has been enabled to accommodate already, 48 convalercent pa. tients, and hopes shortly to accommedate as many mose.

The Physicians of the Hospital reported that they had wisited within the last three or four days upwerds of seconty persons in typhus fever in their own habita. tions, who, for want of further accommodation, could not be admitted into the Hospital.

From the foregoing statement it appears that a debt is now actually due by the Hospital, to the amount of \$104; ibat a further debt of about \$140 must necessarily be incorred before the close of the year on 5th Jan, next ; so that at that period a debt of about £244 will be due of the Hospital-nor will any of its regular income become due, except 2100 from his Majesty's Treasury, until after next Assizes.

The following Resolutions were proposed by the

Mayor, and seconded by the Collector :-

Resolved unanimously-That our chairman be rea quested to lay the case of this Hospital before his Exam collency the Lord Lieutenant, praying such further aid as his Excellency may see fit to grant, to coable the Governors, under the blessing of Goo, to check the further spread of this most alarming and still very prevalent disease, and to provide more extensive aca commodation for the present and future patients of the Hospital.

Reseived-That the warmest thanks of the Governors be returned to the inhabitants of this city, for their most timely and liberal aid hitherto afforded, whereby the Governors have been anabled, far beyond their most sanguine expectations, to extend the benefit of this Institution.

Resolved-Unanimously-That our heat and sincer-
