DIED—It is with infinite regret, we announce the demise of George Smyth, Esq. late Recorder of this city, at Teignmouth, Devonshire, on Saturday last. By his numerous friends and highly respectable family, his loss will be felt with deep and poignant anguish. The qualities of head and heart, endeared him to all who were honored by his acquaintance. The office of Mayor of this city, he filled in the year 1789, with zeal and activity: a firm and unbiassed integrity marked his public career: the innocent met his suffrage; but delinquency felt his power. In the arduous office of Assistant-Barrister for the County of Tipperary, which he held for many years, his professional abilities and sterling worth, rendered him highly beneficial, and his important services as Recorder of this city, for 30 years, will long be remembered. In 1813, when he retired from office, the Corporation presented him with a gold box, accompanied by an Address. He was a principal in all the public charities of this city, and chief founder of many, particularly the Jubilee Loan Society; nor was his humanity confined to public acts of beneficence—unostentatious, his virtues sought the shade; not the gaze of publicity—benevolence was not an holiday garb; it was early put on, and so fitted to this amiable man, that it made a part of himself.
