We have, more than once, called the attention of the Magistrates and Gentlemen of this County to the disturbed state of many parts of it, and at each time have we mentioned that only one remedy can be found to check those ontrages which now seem so habitual and are almost exclusively our own. In the County Tipperary, the enormities were so great and manifold, that the eyes of all were fixed upon it, and each day brought forth some new scene of horror-yet a remedy was found, which has checked the mania, and it is now in a comparative state of tranquillity. The Gentlemen of that district are not yet satisfied with its product 2 they feel the accessity of a further continuance of the operation of so salutary a remedy, and by a late application, have solicited from Government, a renewal of the Pence Preservation Act, which, by its formation, has run out its course there. Not so with us :-- when the insurrection Act had operated so as to produce a little quiet, we were lulled with the prospect, and wo sheathed the sword which must now be resorted to ugain with rigour and determination. These observations are drawn from us, as a prelude to one of those acts of violence and brutality, which are committed in this neighbourhood, and of which the following is a lamentable ensample:

DREADFUL OUTRAGE AND MURDER.

Yesterday morning, at three o'clock, a party of man exceeding twenty, well armed, knocked at the door of Mr. Christopher Sparling, a respectable householder of the village of Patrick's-Well, in this county, and demanded a poor stranger who had taken up his lodging there, in the capacity of a School-master. -- The demand was resolutely refused; on which the ruffians broke in the windows and cotered the house; they then committed every description of violence, broke the furniture, heat Sparing his man-servant and the school-master, in a most cruet manner, and even the females did not escape there brutality. A young man named Samuel Cress, who had been on a visit at Sparling's, in endeavouring to keep the door of the room where he slept, was shot through the head, of which he instantly died.

This most drendful outrage has aroused the feelings of the Gentry, and accordingly yesterday, several Magistrates, with Major-General O'Loughli-, attended at Patrick's-well, where depositions were received which we trust may lead to the apprehension of the
