We understand that Madigan has absconded.

On Tuesday night last, an armed Banditti, consisting of five men, attacked the house of James Hallinan, in the neighbourhood of Quinn; three of the men entered, and demanded his arms, and beat him unmercifully—one of them snapped a musket at Hallinan three times, but fortunately it missed fire.—The villains after robbing Hallinan of his musket and powder horn, repaired to the house of Terence Kennedy, in the same neighbourhood, broke open a chest and robbed Kennedy of twenty guineas; Kennedy's brother endeavoured to make his escape, by getting out of the back door, when three shots were fired at him, but without effect.—It appears that the same gang attacked the house of John Kerin, herdsman to Mr. Bindon, who had a gun belonging to his master, for the purpose of protecting his property, broke open his door, and robbed him of the gun.

At the last fair of Athlone, the attendance of buyers of all descriptions was numerous and respectable. The demand for horses was in general, good; such cows and heifers sold well, and pigs rather high. Grey yarn was in great request.

The working silk weavers of Dublin have addressed the Ladies of Ireland, on their present distressed situation, owing to the great advance in the price of raw silk, which has prevented the manufacturers from giving them constant employment; and they express a hope that the Ladies will not contribute to their calamities by preferring foreign fabrics to native; and conclude by asserting, that silks, tabinets, velvets, scarfs, and handkerchiefs, are now as well manufactured in the City of Dublin, as any ever imported.
