after an illness of sixteen days, Ringrose Atkins, Esq.
Surgeon of the Tipperary regt. of Militia. Society
has not often had to lament a loss of more affliction
and melancholy. Doctor Atkins caught the disorder
of which he died in the charitable exercise of his
professional talent, which was unremittingly devoted
to the relief of the indigent. He was taken off from
the active employment of that talent, in which he
ranked most deservedly very high, just at the time
when his knowledge and benevolence came to be
justly and universally appreciated; for while his skill
was indefatigably laborious in the relief of the sick,
his purse was uniformly open in affording the unpro-
vided sufferers those auxiliaries, without which medi-
cine had been useless; and his example and his
solicitations were of most essential advantage in for-
warding every work of charity. He was snatched
from an amiable wife and nine young children, with
whom he lived in the most perfect enjoyment of
domestic happiness. The loss of an ordinary charac-
ter, with such attachments, so suddenly hurried out
of life, against the most able skill and care, would
afflict the mind; but, we repeat it, we do not recollect
to have deplored a more excellent man, at a more
critical period of life for his fellow creatures, his family
and himself, or under circumstances altogether of more
bitter calamity. The only consolation to his family
is, that he died after a life spent in the practice of
every christian virtue, which was closed in the full use
of its reason, and in that most perfect and pious
resignation, that is derived at once from the fortitude
and humility of a good conscience, filled with the
hopes that are inspired by religion. His remains
were on Saturday deposited in the family vault at
