Last Monday, the body of a man was discovered in a small lake in Doon Deer Park, and contiguous to the road. There was a hay rope about his neck, and a stone tied to the end of it; his throat was cut from ear to ear, his scull beat in, as if with a heavy weapon, and one of his arms nearly cut off. A promissary note was found in his pocket, payable to "Michael Drinan," which induces a belief that that was the name of the dead man. The name of the makers of the note was a little defaced, but supposed to be "John Grace and James Grace" and witnessed by "William Pierson." An Inquest was held by Thomas Sampson, Esq. Coroner, and a verdict of Wilful Murder pronounced against some person or persons unknown. The body had the appearance of having been for some weeks in the situation where it was found.

On Thursday night, a young vagrant broke a pane of glass in the shop of Messrs. Bennis, Grocers, in George's-street, while the family were at dinner, with the intent of stealing some goods which were in the window; he was, however, detected, and committed to jail by Alderman Wilkinson. This young fellow, it appears, is one of the gang who prowl about the streets at night, and whose depredations we noticed in our last.

On Sunday evening, as Mr. Ryan, son of Mr. Myles Ryan, of Newtown-Ellard, in this Co. was returning home from Cappamore, where he had dined, he was thrown from his horse in crossing the river at Killuragh, which had greatly swollen with the late floods, and was unfortunately drowned.

A poor man, named John Enright, who lives on the hill near Bannacurra turn-pike, returning from his work at Mr. Conneil's brewery, where he received a fortnight's wages, was robbed last night, on the Circular Road, and most unmercifully cut and bruised. Not a night passes that robberies are not perpetrated on that road.

Some slight hopes are entertained of the recovery of Hannon, Mr. Bigg's Steward, who was desperately wounded, as stated in our last.—Surgeon Thwait's, has been in attendance on the unfortunate man, since the event.

On Sunday night last, some fellows got into the Roman Catholic Chapel in Bandon, after which they broke open the boxes, and took thereout about seven or eight pounds of different collections which lay in them, and a Chalice belonging to the Priest.

Three men were suffocated in a lime kiln at Knock, near Fermoy, on Monday.
