the County Court, before the Solicitor-General,  
on Monday, Mr. Holmes O'Connell, of Kanturk, was ar-  
rested and tried for perjury—which alledged charge  
was out of a prosecution at the last Assizes of Cork,  
by Mr. Charles Bastable, a respectable Attorney,  
convicted of conspiring in uttering a promissory  
note of £100 of Mr. O'Connell's, in order to defraud  
Messrs. Bruce, of Charleville, Bankers. Mr. Quin  
was the case, and a great part of the day was occu-  
pied in reading affidavits; when, at a late hour yes-  
ter evening, the Court adjourned till this morning,  
when the investigation was resumed. The trial, from  
the respectability of the parties, has excited some  
interest, and is of import. Several of the leading

At eleven o'clock this morning, the Solicitor-Gen-  
eral deciding the incompetency of the examination  
of the witness, on the ground that he was convicted  
of perjury. The Jury acquitted Mr. O'Connell,  
and he was discharged.
