DIED—On Sunday evening, in Upper George's-
 street, aged 88 years, the Rev. William Mansell,
 Archdeacon and Precentor of the Diocese of Kildare.
 To treat of his private and public character where it
 is so well known, is almost unnecessary; but we would
 be entirely inexcusable, when relating this melancholy
 event, if we suffered so much worth, so much virtue to
 descend into the tomb untold. In his early years he
 attached himself to a profession the most suitable to
 his disposition, the most congenial to his feelings: as
 a Minister of the Church of Christ, he was ever found,
 in all its paths, a worthy member and a faithful pastor:
 an Archdeaconry was the highest situation he would
 accept, though, perhaps, the greatest dignitaries might
 have been within his reach. His years multiplied his
 virtues, and every succeeding one rendered him still
 more valuable to that society, which, in his death, has
 lost one of its most truly worthy members; in every
 relation he sustained, he has created a void which will
 be long and seriously felt. He was ever on the watch
 for opportunities of extending his benevolence without
 distinction of sect; like the good Samaritan, he poured
 the wine and oil into the heart of the afflicted; the
 sinner was relieved of his despairing doubts, and
 taught to look on a Crucified Redeemer, as the all
 sufficient ransom for fallen man; but it was not spiri-
 tual aid alone that he imparted, his purse was never
 closed, and the wretched never left him unrelieved.
 His mortal remains have sunk into the grave full of
 years and honor, whilst his immortal soul has winged
 its happy flight to the bosom of his Creator. His
 remains will be interred to-morrow morning in
 the family vault, at St. John's, in this City.—In
 London, to the deep and sincere regret of all who
 had the honor and happiness of her acquaintance,
 Mrs. Monsell, wife of William Thomas Monsell, Esq.
 of Tervoe, in this County. In all the relative duties
 of wife, parent and friend, few could equal, none
 excel this most lamented Lady; her loss to the poor
 at Tervoe will be seriously felt, as her benevolence
